WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

New Tests to Be Made by Schwab and Johnson.

Schwab, president of the Northwestern Wireless Telegraph and Telephone company of Chicago, and Professor Warren Johnson of this city, will, within the next few days, conduct tests to demonstrate the usefulness of wireless telegraphy on boats on the great lakes. The test will be from one of the Pere Marquette boats, and it proves a success Superintendent Mercereau of the Pere Marquette company, will install the system on all its boats. Mr. Mercereau was not wholly satisfied with the tests that were made during the Erie-Tashmoo race, but he has learned that arrangements were made in such a hurry that a good demonstration was not expected.

DIDN'T "HIT IT OFF" PHILIPPINE WEALTH

Why the Balfour-Sartoris Engagement Was Broken. Establishment of Peace Means Development of Resources.

THEIR TIFFS WERE FREQUENT

End of the Romance Regarded a Triumph of Common Sense.

London, June 25.—Vivian Sartoris and Archibald Balfour found their courtship and engagement so squally that they decided not to venture upon the stormy sea of matrimony.

This is the explanation of the broken engagement that their relatives give. The granddaughter of General Ulysses S. Grant and the brother-in-law of Alfred Littleton and distant cousin of Arthur Balfour, the leader in the house of commons, are persons who know their own minds, and the end of their idyl, though prosy, is called by their friends a triumph of common sense.

They met barely eighteen months ago at a party given by an aunt of Archibald Balfour's, at which Miss Sartoris was chaperoned by her late father's cousin, Mrs. Henry Gordon. Another party brought them together a few weeks later, and the result was that Mr. Balfour was invited to Seven Oaks, where Miss Vivian and her sister Rosie have a pleasant little cottage close to the country house of Mrs. Gordon. But familiarity increased only their mutual respect, and failed to fan the flame of love. Each held decided opinions and their points of divergence were plentiful, but their points of contact. They could agree on few things of importance. Tiffs were frequent, and more than once the engagement was broken, but the quarrels were as frequently patched up through the good offices of Mrs. Gordon.

About a fortnight ago they had a hot quarrel over furnishing and other topics connected with the marriage, and by mutual consent they decided that nothing but misery could follow if they were to take the step that would bind them to each other forever. At a meeting of representatives of both families it was decided that the interests of the two most concerned demanded that no attempt should be made to heal this latest breach, and so the engagement was broken off.

EMPEROR'S ASSAILANT

It Is Decided Not to Prosecute Dietrich Weiland.

Leipzig, June 25.—The first criminal section of the imperial court, sitting in Camera today, decided not to prosecute Dietrich Weiland, the man who at Bremen, in March last, threw a piece of iron at Emperor William, wounding him in the cheek, and who has since been pronounced by physicians to be insane. The court admitted the assault upon his majesty while in an irresponsible condition.

Lincoln, Neb., June 25.—Mrs. H. C. Tieman, a comely woman of 25 years, who has figured in Lincoln society functions and whose character, acquaintances say, is without blemish, was yesterday publicly whipped Robert Van Brunt, a railroad man, last evening. The place was public, a street corner, and the weapon a short rattle, which the woman used with vicious intent, leaving two crimson welts on the face of her victim.

Mrs. Tieman says Van Brunt has traduced her character, continuously hounded and insulted her. Yesterday she says, he telephoned her, asking an appointment. She consulted the police and was advised to have the man arrested or horsewhipped, and decided on the latter course. Mrs. Tieman says she did not complain to her husband, a Union Pacific conductor, because she feared a shooting affray.

Correspondence of the Associated Press.

Manila, May 22, 1901.—About the time this correspondence is published in the United States, civil government will have succeeded military control throughout the Philippines. The islands still excepted from peaceful civil rule will be few and remote. The only large ones, Mindoro and Paragua, are in a quietest rather than a rebellious condition. According to all calculations, the surrender or capture of Luzon and the beginning at least of the pacification of Samar will have been accomplished within a few weeks, so that the organization of municipal and provincial governments in that stubbornly insurgent island will not be much longer delayed.

The inauguration of the purely civil government is expected to give a considerable impetus to business. Although the amendments attached by congress to the Spooner act prohibit granting of public franchises or disposal of public land and mining rights, and although no authority has been conferred for the organization of corporations, still the individual American business man is generally optimistic over the prospects of commercial success predicted for the near future. The war, while it caused adversity in the provinces, has all along brought prosperity to Manila and the English, German and American business men have been and are making money. Now, with the coming of peace, trade with the provinces is beginning to boom and it is quite apparent that the trade of Manila, Iloilo and Cebu with continental Asia is likely to greatly surpass the expectations of Americans in general.

Mr. Hull's Views.

In a recent conversation with the correspondent, Congressman Hull of Iowa, said:

The business development of the Philippines was set back a year by congress' refusal to permit the granting of franchises. The new congress must, of course, at its coming session, legislate for the islands, and if we are going to insist that no franchises be granted for the promotion of large business enterprises we virtually say that we are opposed, or at least indifferent, to the development of the Philippines.

Mr. Hull, in common with all more intelligent Americans who come to the Philippines in these days, believe the business future of the islands and of Manila in particular is bright with promise. Mr. Hull and his associates in lumbering enterprises have recently had practical demonstration of the fact that Philippine lumber will sell in the American market.
