**IN A NUTSHELL**

New Haven—The body of Adelbert S. Hay has been taken to Cleveland for interment.

San Francisco—The army transport Grant has arrived from Manila with the Forty-eighth Infantry.

Philadelphia—Final arrangements have been made by the Turkish government for having a swift cruiser built at the Cramp yards.

Seattle—Gold receipts by the steamship Dolphin from the Klondike yesterday were: For Canadian Bank of Commerce, \$1,000,000; individual dust, \$250,000.

Washington—For the first time since she was brought home from California, Mrs. McKinley yesterday was able to go downstairs and join the president at luncheon.

Boston—The directors of the Edison Electric Illuminating company have voted to consolidate and to merge under the title of the Edison Electric Illuminating company.

Oakland, Cal.—Edna Wallace Hopper, the actress, died here twenty-four hours too late to see her mother alive. By her mother's will she will inherit a fortune of \$500,000.

Pana, Ill.—W. Z. Rickhart was arrested charged with kidnaping two of his children. Rickhart came all the way from Crowley, Iowa, to steal his two children and take them home with him.

Washington—Millions and millions of Buffalo Pan-American stamps have been sent but the demand for stamps is so large that but the demand for stamps is so large that

an additional night shift has been put to work to catch up with the work. Ten million were ordered a few days ago.

San Antonio, Texas—Gregorio Cortez, the Mexican arrested in the mines above Laredo after a long chase, on the charge of having killed two sheriffs and a posseman, has been brought here and placed in jail.

Washington—Frank A. Vanderlip, ex-assistant secretary of the treasury, just home from abroad, says all Europe is preparing for a strike war upon the United States. Most of our commercial treaties expire in 1902.

Milwaukee—The Wisconsin district of Evangelical Lutherans of the Missouri synod last night adopted resolutions prohibiting any of its members from taking part in any public entertainment where "rag time" music is played.

Washington—Secretary Long has approved the designs for the two medals provided for by congress to commemorate the achievements of the United States navy in the campaign in the West Indies during the Spanish-American war.

Indianapolis—L. A. Rosing, chairman of the Minnesota democratic committee, is here in conference with Thomas Sargent. He is said to have promised Minnesota's support if Taggart will run for national chairman to succeed Jones.

Boston—Judge Brown, of the United States circuit court, has decided adversely to the American Bell Telephone company in the suit for infringement of patents brought against the National Telephone Manufacturing company and the Century Telephone company.

Sandusky, Ohio—Mrs. Clara S. Newberry, wife of Professor Newberry, who recently began suit for alimony but subsequently withdrew her petition, has begun suit for absolute divorce, charging her husband with unfaithfulness. Mrs. Newberry is the daughter of Andrew D. White, ambassador to Germany.

Chicago—C. F. VanWinkle, owner of many flats and much vacant property, has evolved a scheme whereby babies can pay rent. He offers to rent one year's rental to any baby born in any of his houses, and if the family is blessed with twins he will accept that fact as an equivalent for two years' rental, thus building up the population of the city and giving the babies a show.

Pittsburg—By the wrecking of a train on the Pittsburg & Lake Erie railroad, at Monaca, two persons are dead and forty more or less hurt. The dead are William J. Cunningham, fireman, McKees Rocks, Pa., and Lowry Black, baggage-master, Pittsburg. The fatally injured are Mrs. Lola B. Perkins, Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. James Lee, Washington, Pa.; and Mrs. Jefferson Case, Beaver, Pa.

### CABLE FLASHES

London—The sultan of Morocco has authorized his envoy, now in London, Kaid El Mehdjel Menehbi, to negotiate a commercial treaty with Great Britain, which will open Morocco to European commerce.

Madrid—The anticlerical rioters, who paraded the streets Sunday night shouting "Burn the convents" and who hissed the Infanta Isabella stormed a monastery during the night. They were dispersed by the police.

Havana—The condition of General Wood, who has been suffering from grip and malarial fever, which, however, did not interrupt his official duties, is serious. His fever is considerably higher and he has been forced to take to his bed.

Peking—All the ministers of the foreign powers with the exception of Sir Ernest Satow, the British minister, have agreed to the Russian proposal to increase the Chinese tariff on imports to 10 per cent in the event of a deficiency in the securing of the indemnity. Japan has increased her indemnity demand.

Havana—The republican and national parties have signified their approval of the Platt amendment. The national party takes this action with the understanding that it will later use all possible legal means to effect the repeal of the amendment. Juan Gomez Bortero bitterly opposed this movement, and has resigned from the party and given up the editorship of La Patria, the party organ.

### MINNESOTA

LIVERNE—For the first time in several years Liverne will celebrate the Fourth.

SAUK RAPIDS—Mr. and Mrs. Philip Beaurieu celebrated their golden wedding yesterday.

GLENCOE—During a severe thunder shower lightning struck Miss Sarah Hopps. She will recover.

LAKE CITY—Conrad Selvers, a wealthy farmer residing in the town of Lake, was robbed of \$200 by two unknown men.

ST. CLOUD—Adelard Jayol was held to the grand jury on a charge of shooting with intent to kill his wife, who has recovered.

NORTHFIELD—Charles E. Drake, one of the pioneers of this vicinity, died at his home two miles south. He was 76 years of age.

BUFFALO—The annual meeting of the old settlers of Wright county took place to-day. Governor Van Sant was present and made an address.

BEMIDJI—C. H. Miles has purchased the J. W. White property, corner of Beltrami and Second street, and will erect a brick building three stories high.

WELLS—Superintendent W. H. Hollands of Wells has been appointed conductor of the Rice county summer school at Faribault to succeed Mr. Kilgore, resigned.

WINONA—The residence of A. Beinhorn, a jeweler, was entered and a child's bank, containing about \$10, taken. The residence of A. Bohm was also entered and some money carried away.

HOWARD LAKE—In the case of C. Lavin against the Great Northern Railway company for injuries received by the overturning of a freight car, the jury brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for \$2,000.

DULUTH—The sale of the Duluth, Red Wing & Southern road will make the stock of the Duluth, Red Wing & Southern Construction company worth par.—The strike of electric linemen continues and there have been numerous attempts at settlement without success.

### WISCONSIN

ELLSWORTH—F. Rudolph of the town of Ellsworth fell dead of heart disease.

ASHLAND—Nearly 60,000 tons of ore were shipped to-day. The value of ore and lumber shipments for one day exceeded \$250,000.

PRENTICE—George Avery, living one mile east, was found lying on the floor dead by his 13-year-old son. Heart failure was the cause.

BLACK RIVER FALLS—The mercury registered 100 yesterday. Hans Olerst, while having, was overcome by heat. His recovery is doubtful.

OLIVET—Robert Gorman fell twenty-five feet from a lumber pile, sustaining serious injuries. Ole Peterson of the town of Spring Lake was buried in a cistern which he was excavating. Both men are in a serious condition.

WEST SUPERIOR—John O'Connor, who broke away from the workhouse, has been recaptured and has been sent back to work.

with a ball and chain—Katie Yereches, who was injured in the West Superior Hotel fire, is in a serious condition.

GRAND RAPIDS—Three boys, all under 12 years of age, were drowned below the dam of the Port Edwards Paper company yesterday. They were Sidney Larson, Arthur Clarence and Elmer Reuce. The boys went in for a swim and were spent-off their feet and into deep water.

MILWAUKEE—Another injunction against striking machinists was issued yesterday, the plaintiff being the Bucyrus Steam Shovel company of South Milwaukee. The nature of the order is similar to the one issued on Saturday at the instance of the Vilter Manufacturing company.
