 Western Counties of North Dakota Working for It.  
**PETITIONS FOR ORGANIZATION**  
 Badly Muddled Condition of County Affairs—Patterson and His Palladium.

 Bismarck, N. D., June 26.—Petitions are being circulated among the residents of the old unorganized counties of Allred, Church, Renville and Mountrail, in the northern part of the state, lying on both sides of the Missouri river, for the organization of those territories into counties. These petitions will be presented to Governor White and when this matter comes up the Missouri river, and the east and west of the Missouri river, and the state at large, will find itself face to face with an embarrassing and perplexing situation. Under the recent county boundary decision of the supreme court, the status of the territory west of the Missouri river has been defined. The law assuming to attach the unorganized territory to the territory of the Missouri river, which is held to be invalid, the legislature back in 1891 passed a similar act, attaching the unorganized territory east of the river to the counties of Ward, Williams, McLean, McHenry and other counties. The petitions for the organization of this territory into counties will bring the matter directly to an issue.
