WAGNER IS SMOOTH
 Old Check Game as Worked By a New Richmonder.
 SCORES OF VICTIMS IN HIS NET
 Bogus Checks on Lumber Firms Are Cashied by County Merchants and Saloonkeepers.
 Special to The Journal.
 New Richmond, Wis., June 26.—Today's developments indicate that the fraudulent check operations of Harry L. Wagner alias Harry L. Williams of this city were on a more extensive scale than was at first suspected. While he has been working it for a year past, the most extensive swindling has been done during the past four months and all within a radius of 150 miles of New Richmond.
 He would disguise himself as a lumberjack just returning from the winter's work in the woods, and drop into some town, call on a saloonkeeper or merchant, make a purchase and present in payment a good sized check purporting to be issued on some prominent lumber company, generally the Rust-Owen company of Eau Claire, taking the balance in cash. As far as can be ascertained, he succeeded in working his "grat" in every instance, the most extensive hauls being in West Superior and Duluth, where he spent several weeks. Scores of farmers in this vicinity are wearing boots, mackinaws, clothing, etc., purchased from Wagner as part of his haul, at almost nothing.
 Wagner traveled on mileage credentials under the name of Wagner and alias Williams, taking no special pains to conceal his identity. His plan was to work a few towns, then come back to New Richmond and lay low till things blew over. He apparently had his bogus checks printed in St. Paul. He is still at large, with the officers in pursuit.

CIGARETTES MADE HIM CRAZY.

His mind has been falling for some time, but he did not become violent until yesterday. He is so violent it has taken the combined efforts of six men to keep him under control.

REVENUE STAMP REFUND.
 Washington, June 26.—The commissioner of internal revenue, Yerkes, has decided that the value of proprietary stamps properly affixed and cancelled on proprietary articles, not removed from factory for sale or use before July 1, 1901, may be refunded on proper application to the collector from whom the stamps were purchased.
PITT NOT GUILTY.
 Manila, June 26.—Harold M. Pitt, manager of Evans & Co., government contractors, who has been on trial on charges of improperly purchasing government stores, was acquitted to-day. Four other purchasers of commissary stores were found guilty and fined \$1,000 each.
LILLYWHITE RELEASED.
 London, June 26.—Charles Lillywhite, the naturalized American citizen who was arrested in Wellington, N. Z., last November, on a charge of being Arthur Blatch, who committed a murder at Colchester in 1892, and in whose case a nole procedure was entered, was released from custody to-day.

NATIONAL PARK MEN
 Fifth Annual Convention Begun in Milwaukee.
 Milwaukee, June 26.—The fifth annual convention of the American Park and Outdoor Art association opened a three-day session at the Hotel Pfister to-day. Fifty delegates are present. After an address by Mayor Rose, President L. E. Holden of Cleveland delivered his annual address. The secretary treasurer's report showed a growth in membership and the association to be entirely free from debt. A paper entitled "Open Space Movement," written by Mrs. Basil Holmes of England, was read by Mrs. Herman J. Hall of Chicago and generally discussed. J. G. W. Cowles of Cleveland read a paper on "The Cleveland Park System." The delegates were driven through the parks this afternoon.
MARSHALL FIELD BUYS IN NEW YORK.
 New York, June 26.—Marshall Field, the Chicago merchant, has purchased the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Thirty-fifth street. The cost has exceeded \$1,000,000. The Marshall Field company was incorporated at Albany a few weeks ago. It was denied then by the Chicago interests that an extensive establishment was contemplated in this state. The incorporation was explained by the statement that it would facilitate the business of the concern in New York.
VERY AGED PENSIONER.
 Washington, June 26.—A pension of \$12 a month has just been granted to Mrs. Pearl Decker of Philadelphia. She is the widow of a soldier of the war of 1812, is nearly 90 years old, and is blind. Her husband has been dead nearly twenty-one years and Mrs. Decker will receive arrears of pension for that whole period, amounting to a little more than \$3,000. Mrs. Decker, it is believed, is the oldest person to whom a pension was ever granted.

 New York, June 26.—Senator Chauncey M. Depew has just made his last will and testament, not because he is ill, but because he sailed for Europe to-day and he believes in being on the safe side.

WHO FIRED FIRST?
 Young Man and Former Sweetheart Found Dead.
 Quincy, Ill., June 26.—Frank C. Forrest, a well-known young man of this city, and his former sweetheart, Louise Strothoff, were found dead in a country road near the Strothoff home, five miles out. One had been shot through the head and the other through the heart. It is impossible to learn who fired the first shot.
