WOMAN'S SALOON RIGHTS

THEY'RE EQUAL TO THOSE OF MEN

So Decides a Colorado Judge and This is a Victory for Restaurant Keepers.

Denver, Col., July 4.—Colorado women have the same privileges as men of entering saloons, wineries and restaurants and calling for any kind of drinks they wish. Judge Palmer decided the question in a suit to test the power of the city to close restaurants that sell liquor with meals on Sunday. The ruling is a victory for the restaurateurs. In deciding the case Judge Palmer held that a restaurant may sell liquors to its patrons on Sunday, that the city ordinance prohibiting wineries and the sale of liquor to women is unconstitutional, that women may enter saloons and saloon-keepers may sell to them beer and whisky the same as men; that saloon-keepers may conduct wineries in connection with their saloons and in them serve drinks to men and women. The decision concludes: Any enactment relative to the sale of liquor whereby a woman is prohibited from purchasing liquors under the same circumstances that a man is in violation of her rights under the equal suffrage constitution and is in violation to the right given a saloon-keeper to sell to a woman as well as a man. By that act the last vestige of inequality between man and woman under the laws of the state of Colorado was swept away.

EAU CLAIRE—Kendall Kerr has secured for \$3,000 Miss Hazel Kerr's interest in the Churchill site selected for the new federal building, with the purpose of preventing the government from securing possession. It is expected the government will take the portions of the site to which Churchill can give title and then condemn the property bought by Kerr, thus defeating the latter's purpose.

KENOSHA—A letter was picked up in a box on the banks of Lake Michigan which states that H. R. Abbott and Carl E. Plum of Chicago lost their lives in an open boat off Waikuan on April 1. No men answering to these names have been reported missing from Chicago or any other port.

BLACK RIVER FALLS—Mrs. William Lindow, the wife of a German farmer, died suddenly June 22, and indications of foul play are strong against the husband. The body will be exhumed and an autopsy held.

HAMMOND—The annual report of the treasurer of school district No. 1 shows receipts for the past year of \$4,449.98 and expenditures of \$4,315.66. Dr. E. L. Boothby was re-elected district clerk.

WEST SUPERIOR—Harold and Edward Widang, aged 15 and 13 respectively, run away from their home in Winnipeg, and are being sought here. They claim to have been cruelly treated at home.

NEW RICHMOND—Levi Oakes has disposed of twenty acres of his farm to a syndicate formed for the purpose of developing the property for gold, the indications of which are promising.

LA CROSSE—Physicians are puzzled over the case of 17-year-old Philip Linds, who, it is believed, has hydrophobia. It required the combined strength of six officers to get him to the hospital.

POND DU LAC—C. D. Smith, in behalf of New York capitalists, has secured the right of way for a proposed interurban line from Fond du Lac to Oshkosh, a distance of about twenty miles.

CUMBERLAND—Harry L. Wagner, who swindled merchants by passing forged checks, aggregating \$2,000, has made a confession. He was committed to the county jail to await trial.

MARSHFIELD—Mrs. Michael Ticy died yesterday as a result of the heat.

LOVED THE SAME MAN

THIS IS WHY THE GIRLS FOUGHT

Second is Fatally Wounded and One of the Principals Hurt—Were Knocked From a Bridge.

New York Sun Special Service. Inez, Ky., July 4.—Two young women, each aided by her sister, met on a bridge ten miles east of here and engaged in a desperate fight because they were in love with the same youth. One of the seconds may die, while her principal is hurt severely. The girls were Cora Newson and Alice Chapman; both were infatuated with Rush Munoy.

When the girls met, Munoy asked Cora Newson to give his ring to Alice Chapman. As she was in the act of handing the ring over she slashed Miss Chapman with a knife she had concealed in her handkerchief. This angered Dixie Chapman, who at once took her sister's part and stabbed Miss Newson twice, one cut severing the biceps muscle of the right arm. In the fight which followed Dixie Chapman was knocked from the bridge. She fell fifteen feet and both arms were fractured. She may die. Both Miss Chapman and Miss Newson are well known and prominent, and the affair has caused a great sensation.

IN A NUTSHELL

Washington—President McKinley gave a dinner at the White House last night in honor of General Maximo Gomez.

Washington—Myron T. Herrick of Cleveland, Ohio, is to succeed George V. L. Meyer of Massachusetts as United States ambassador to Italy.

Vancouver, B. C.—A news trans-Pacific route has been decided by the Empress of China. The ship made the run from Yokohama, a distance of 4,300 miles, in nine days and eighteen hours.

Washington—A marine rural postal delivery route has been put in operation at Oconomowoc Lake, Wisconsin, and has proven so successful that similar routes will probably be established.

Indianapolis—It is believed that Judge John H. Baker of the United States district court will be promoted to the circuit court of appeals, to take the place of the late Judge William A. Wood.

Wichita—Secretary Smiley of the State Grain Dealers' Association, after making personal investigation, says that the oats crop of Kansas will be the worst failure in ten years, and that only an immediate rain can save the crop.

Memphis—Dr. Paul Malmstrom, a well-known physician, was twice assaulted in his office by a mysterious woman who pounded him on the head with a heavy case. The woman has not been arrested, although it is claimed her identity is known.

San Francisco—There is a discrepancy of about \$50,000 between the books of one department and those of another in the United States mint, and the whole clerical force is trying to ascertain whether there is a shortage or whether some bookkeeper has made an error.

Kearney, Neb.—Rev. L. G. Broecker of the Evangelical church, who was about to be arrested for legitimate outrage of Harriet Longmate's child, committed suicide by shooting. He was 49 years of age and leaves a wife and six children. He had vehemently protested his innocence and it is believed he committed temporarily insane.

Washington—A special report to Secretary Root by a Philippine officer indicates that civil government for a long time, at least, will be a failure on the islands. The report shows that in many
