

CORCORAN THE RIOTER

Strong Movement in Idaho for His Release by Pardon.

Special to The Journal, Boise City, Idaho, July 5.—Laboring people all over the United States are deeply interested in the case of Paul Corcoran, convicted of rioting in Coeur d'Alene and now in the penitentiary here. A. A. Fraser of this city will present the case before the state board of pardons in the shape of a petition of over 5,000 male voters of the northern part of the state, among them eight members of the jury who convicted him. All who participated in the riots are now at large except Corcoran, and it is thought he has suffered sufficiently for the sins of others. Opinion here to-day is that the board will extend clemency to him.

ARGENTINE'S UNREST

Martial Law to Be Declared in Buenos Aires.

UNPOPULAR UNIFICATION SCHEME

More Rioting Occurs and Still More Serious Trouble Looked For.

Buenos Aires, July 5.—The government has sent a message to the senate, in view of the rioting on account of the bill for unification of the public debt, requesting authorization to proclaim martial law in this city and the suburbs, which form a federal district. The senate has approved of martial law for the district and the chamber of deputies will now consider the question.

Rioting is being continued. A large crowd endeavored to attack the offices of El Pais and La Tribuna, and newspapers which are supporting the financial policy of the administration. The rioters were repulsed by the police, who are now attending to their duties more energetically. Several persons were injured in the encounter. The Plaza de Mayo and other points are guarded by troops. It is believed that martial law will not be established.

A committee of merchants has decided to visit President Roca and request him to abandon the project for the unification of the public debt. The chamber of deputies will discuss the bill at once. Thousands of opponents of the financial policy will meet in front of the house of congress. Serious encounters are feared. It is asserted that upon the character of distributed arms among supporters of the administration, particularly among the rabble element, in order that they may attack the opponents of the unification bill.

NEW TITLE FOR EDWARD

SOME OBSTACLES IN THE WAY

Could Not Be Made "Emperor" of Self-Governing Colonies Like Canada.

New York, July 5.—Commenting upon Mr. Chamberlain's announcement in the house of commons that the title of King Edward will be changed, the London correspondent of the Tribune says:

The king cannot well be made emperor of self-governing colonies such as Canada and Australia. In circles generally well informed the impression prevails that the words "sovereign of Great Britain" will be added to the present ceremonial title, which is "Edward, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India."

Some people in England, however, believe that the addition will be a complete one, and that Canada, Australia and South Africa will be separately mentioned. The attitude of the opposition will depend upon the character of the title. If it should attempt to extend the title of emperor to any part of the king's dominions outside of India, it will be stoutly opposed.

FIRST OF BULL FIGHTS

TREADOR WAS NEAR DEATH

South Omaha Crowd Cheer On the Spectacle—Two More Fights Scheduled.

Omaha, Neb., July 5.—The first of the three bull fights scheduled for South Omaha during the street fair carnival took place at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was a lively fray. The second, which was to have been called at 7:30 p. m., was postponed on account of rain.

After an exhibition of rough riding by a company of cowboys, the bull fight was announced. Four matily dressed Mexican torreadors entered the ring, marched around the arena to the strains of a Mexican air, and the leader then gave a signal for the admittance of the bull.

The gate was flung open and the animal, a medium-sized shorthorn bull, previously trained and rehearsed for the occasion, came bounding through the opening. He was instantly attracted by the red sash and bright uniform of a torreador opposite the entrance, and charged on him heroically.

The next charge of the bull was more successful, and came near ending seriously. The angered bull knocked the torreador down, and was almost in the act of goring him when the others came to the rescue. The appearance of the other men directly in front of the bull attracted his attention from the fallen man, and he made a rush for the other three, who escaped easily.

After some further exhibition in the use of darts for dispatching bulls, another animal, a Texas bull, was turned into the arena but acted only on the defensive, refusing to charge the torreadors.

GREAT HISTORIAN DIES

Prof. John Fiske a Victim of Excessive Heat.

Gloucester, July 5.—Professor John Fiske of Cambridge, the famous lecturer and historian, died yesterday at the Hawthorn inn, East Gloucester. He came to this city Wednesday and was taken ill soon after arriving at the hotel. The cause of death was cerebral heat, of which he had complained for two days. Mr. Fiske was 55 years of age. He was formerly connected with Harvard college in a professional capacity, and held various relations with the college eighteen years ago, retaining only his office as a member of the board of overseers, and devoting his entire time to lecturing and historical research.

YEAR'S CROP OF RAISINS

CALIFORNIA ASSOCIATION'S PLANS

Will Incorporate Under New Jersey Laws—Not a Large Crop for This Year.

New York, July 5.—Theodore M. Kearney, president of the California Raisin Growers' association, has called for Europe to seek the benefits of the baths at Homburg. He gave the following information regarding the plans of his association, the supply of raisins and the prospective demand:

We had a large crop of raisins last year and did not succeed in selling the whole of the crop. When the holiday trade was over we had 1,500 carloads unsold, out of the 4,000 carloads raised. This year there are of all sorts about 300 cars for the trade to take over. The carry-over will all be cleaned up before the new crop comes in. There has been some talk about the raisin association and prune association not being legally strong. We are asking our growers to sign leases. Every grower must lease his property to the association. The papers have now been prepared and we have incorporated under the laws of New Jersey, and within the next sixty days I expect to have the crop secured by lease. In fact, under the new arrangement, the association will be the producer and the grower will simply be an employee. The association will be the owner of the crop. We are now making a canvass for signatures to those papers and on Sept. 1 I believe all will have signed. I think there will be only a moderate crop of raisins this year.

"MOCKERY OF A CONGRESS"

No True Pan-American Assembly to Be Held.

Lima, Peru, July 5.—Telegrams received from Washington relative to Secretary Hay's attitude as to the discussion of the principle of arbitration at the coming Pan-American congress in Mexico have caused a bad impression in Lima. An editorial in El Comercio headed "The Washington Imbroglia" is quoted as saying: "Frankly, we cannot understand what is passing in Washington. But one thing is evident—the projected Pan-American congress in Mexico cannot meet. At least eight republics for their own self-respect, will accompany Peru in abstaining from the conference, so that the only thing possible is a mockery of a congress, not a real, true Pan-American continental assembly."
