NEW TROTTING TIME

Crescens Goes a Mile in 2:05, Breaking All Records.

THE RACE WAS AT DETROIT, MICH.

The Horse is Owned by George H. Ketcham of Toledo—A \$12,000 Trot Arranged.

Crescens, owned by George H. Ketcham, of Toledo, Ohio, won the free-for-all trot at Grosjean Point track, Detroit, Mich., yesterday. Incidentally he trotted the fastest record ever made.

Charles Herr, owned by David Conall, of Lexington, Ky., was a slow second. Crescens won the first heat by five lengths in 2:06, breaking the racing record for this year on any track, and in the second heat he led by anywhere from five to ten lengths, finishing easily in 2:05 flat, breaking the world's racing record.

In speaking of Crescens' performance, Mr. Ketcham said that after the horse had stepped a half in 1:01 at Cleveland recently he was satisfied that every record was at his mercy.

Crescens meets The Abbott at Brighton Beach, Aug. 15, for \$12,000, and Mr. Ketcham looks for more record breaking.
