Semi-Official Countenance Given It by Russia.

PAN-SLAVIC CONGRESS INCIDENT

Very Moving Letter From the Russian General Rittich is Read.

Correspondence of the Associated Press. St. Petersburg, July 6.—Sokol, or Turner societies play a leading political role in the Polish provinces of Germany and in Bohemia, being rallying points for Polish nationalist and Pan-Slavic propaganda respectively.

The telegram about General Rittich's letter was as follows: "Prague is greatly pleased with the letter which General Rittich sent the city government at the moment of his departure. The general's letter in part is as follows:

To the Czechs, greeting: I came from the far Slavic east, from the slumbering forests of the cold north and the endless steppes of the Black sea, to testify our Russian love for you and to tell you that you can place entire confidence in the power of Russia, and above all to remind you that you must study this immense Russian Slavic land and must make yourself acquainted with it. Only when you Czechs have made yourselves better acquainted with Russia will you learn where the best way lies in their knowledge of themselves, spread abroad their language and their civilization and grant them superiority of earthly goods.

THE TRANS-MISSISSIPPI

ST. PAUL GETS NEXT CONGRESS

Resolutions Adopted Devoted Largely to the Reclamation of Arid Lands.

Cripple Creek, Col., July 19.—The trans-Mississippi Commercial congress yesterday completed the most important of its work, adopted resolutions covering a multitude of subjects of interest to the great west, and selected St. Paul as the next place of assembly.

Among the members of the new executive committee are the following: Montana, M. W. Woodbridge; Nevada, J. W. Miller; Minnesota, S. O. Brooks; South Dakota, E. W. Larlin; Arizona, B. S. Fowler; Iowa, William H. Calhoun.

Gov. Fishback of Arizona, chairman of the committee on resolutions, read the report of the committee, which was adopted. It favors the construction by the general government of reservoirs and canals for the reclamation of arid lands and the enactment of laws by the state and nation to encourage the construction of storage dams to increase the rainfall; suggests the issuance of bonds by the government with which the reclamation of arid lands may be accomplished, the money to be refunded by the settlers in the purchase price of lands; asks for the establishment of a department of mining and a department of commerce, each to be represented in the cabinet; favors a statehood or Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma and a suitable government for the Indian territory; favors the immediate construction of a Pacific cable and the Nicaragua canal; asks that the interstate commerce law be amended; demands the abolition of the fee system in the consular service; favors law to encourage the beet sugar industry; indorses an intercontinental railway; advocates the restoration of the merchant marine; asks more liberal appropriations for river and harbor improvement, and provides for the appointment of a committee of five to lay the above matters before the next congress.

MORRO CASTLE

It Will Be Held Permanently by the United States. Washington, July 19.—In addition to the other bases of supplies demanded in the Platt amendment it is the intention of the administration to permanently garrison Morro castle, overlooking the harbor of Havana. It is the intention to occupy, control and defend the stronghold with United States troops after the government has been notified to do so by the Cuban government. The plan is to equip the fortress with modern artillery in order that Cuba may be assisted in defending herself against outside interference, also that the United States may thus have guarantee against failure on the part of the Cuban government to carry out its pledges and the terms of the treaty now in course of preparation, as between this country and Cuba. Under this treaty the retention of the fort is provided for.

MEN ALL AT WORK

No Idle Hands to Be Found in Building Trades.

WAGES HIGHER IN SOME CASES Demand for Stonemasons and Bricklayers From the Outside Causes Advance.

HANSEN RE-ELECTED Will Again Head the Trades and Labor Council.

Employees Taken Back. The trouble between the Hardwood Manufacturing company and its striking employees has been happily settled. The settlement was until after the union members. All hands were taken back, with the exception of President Hansen, of the union, and those who were given that there would hereafter be no discrimination against union employees. President Hansen will be made business agent of the Bagmakers' Employees' Union.

Jewelry Workers Organize. The jewelry workers have effected an organization, with twenty-seven charter members, and have sent for a charter. About one-half of the members of this craft in Minneapolis have joined in the movement for a union.

Dahlia Heads Woodworkers. At the last meeting of the Woodworkers' Union, Albert Dahlia was elected president in place of S. Stevenson, resigned. It was decided to have no business agent for the present, Business Agent Hansen reporting that, so long as the union label was not recognized, there was no practical need of it.

A Vice President Elected. The Coopers' Union has elected J. E. Carlson vice-president, to take the place of M. M. Gogel, resigned. Mr. Carlson will also be the union's agent for the Trades and Labor Council. John McDonald was elected marshal of the Labor Day Parade and J. L. Murphy organizer.
