NICKEL IS FOUND

A Fine Ledge of the Ore in the Black Hills.

SOME VERY DEEP COPPER MINES

A Rich Copper Strike on the Douglas Range—Reports From Other Fields.

trict, preparations are being made for starting to the golden summit. The depth of this city, there is said to be a good producing gold mine soon, in the Mayflower, which has recently been purchased by Chicago parties. A shaft has not yet reached a depth of 200 feet, on a strong ledge of free-milling ore, that runs about \$20 per ton gold. Near this property, the May Mining company, composed of the same business men has commenced again, to open up a rich ledge of free-milling ore.

The University company, of Vermillion, S. D., has purchased a group of claims on the Douglas range, in the Black Hills, some five miles west of this city. There are several rich ledges of free-milling ore that run well in values. The property will be developed in connection with another property seven miles northwest of this city. At the latter place, a steam hoisting plant has just been installed and a large camp is being built there. A ledge of ore four feet thick is being followed down, which assays as high as \$66 per ton gold.

The Gold Fish company, of Des Moines, Iowa, is sinking a shaft on the old Salmon prospect, in the Black Hills, near this city. This was one of the richest mines in the Hills in the early days. Rich ore is being encountered at present.

RICH COPPER STRIKE

It is found in the Chippewa Mine on the Douglas Range.

West Superior, Wis., July 19.—One of the richest strikes of copper ever made in this country has just been made at the Chippewa mine on the Douglas range. The strike was made on the south cross cut of the mine at the level of 200 feet, and 368 feet from the main shaft on the property. The strike is a new vein which appears to be richer in copper than that which has heretofore been found in the explorations in the western Lake Superior region. The men are now five feet below the vein and find it to be a magnificent body of copper-bearing rock. It is estimated that the greater part of the rock that has so far been blasted out would run from 5 to 7 per cent pure copper. The assay has not been made but it is expected that some gold will be found in addition to the heavy copper. Some of the rock to be found in the strike is epidote, and the other is quartz. Pieces of pure copper as large as a man's thumb have been taken out of the new find. The company is now preparing to sink the shaft to a depth of about 700 feet, where it is now 200 feet down. The pump to take care of the water from the south cross cut is now being constructed. Piling for the stamp mill is still going on.

Everything new points to the successful opening of a number of deep copper mines in the Black Hills, within the next twelve months. The Black Hills has always been looked upon as a gold-producing country, but a number of other valuable metals will soon be on the market. A big firm of Belgium people has bought the famous Sally Cavanaugh tin mine, located at Oreville. They are working through a Deadwood expert. This mine has a very rich ledge of tin ore, and is running as high as 70 per cent white tin. The streams of water in the district are rich in placer tin, showing the hills around to be full of tin bearing lodes. It will require an effort on the part of someone to demonstrate to the world that tin ore in commercial quantities is to be found in the Black Hills, but it is believed that the tin ore coming from the United States will get its supply of tin from the several districts bearing the metal, in the western part of South Dakota.

Blue Lead Smelter.

It will not be long before the Maloney Blue Lead company of Chicago and Deadwood, will have a 50-ton smelter in operation at the famous Blue Lead copper mine, in Pennington county. There are several hundred thousand tons of ore on the surface outcroppings that will run an average of 7 per cent copper. The company is running a 1,500-foot tunnel to tap the main ledge of copper ore on the surface level. It is expected that one of the largest copper mines in the country will be opened there. A good many Colorado and Chicago capitalists are interested in the proposition.

MEASUREMENTS

Regular shipments of mica continue to be made from this city. Black Hills mica is rapidly gaining favor in the market on account of its special adaptability to all electrical uses. It is free from iron and makes a perfect insulator. About 95 per cent of the mica sold on the world's market is used for electrical purposes. This industry is hardly commenced in the southern Black Hills. There are a good many places where it is to be found on the surface in large blocks, when but a little development work would open into deep ledges. The Black Hills Porcelain Clay and Marble company, of Detroit, Mich., has opened up one of the best mica mines in the country and shipments will commence to Chicago in a few days. Another company, of Alpena, Ind., has been shipping for over a year.

The diamond drill for the Black Hills Porcelain Clay and Marble company, has arrived here and it is being set up at the marble proposition six miles east of this city. The big ledge of marble will be exploited its entire length, which is over a mile and a quarter. The sawing plant is also here and as soon as possible the marble and lithographic stone will be ready for the market.

WHERE MUCH OF THE MINING INTEREST IN BRITISH COLUMBIA CENTERS.

Carson, B. C. July 19.—Franklin camp, in which most of the excitement, in a mining way, in this section of British Columbia is now centered, lies about fifty miles from this place on the north fork of Kettle river, and is reached by wagon

road to Lynch creek, a distance of twenty-five miles, and from thence by government pack trail, which will soon be superseded by a wagon road built at government expense. Work on this road is under way. With its advent the camp will be given such transportation facilities as will enable the principal properties to ship ore. A correspondent spent a month in the new camp and visited all of the notable claims, as well as many of lesser repute. The camp is distinguished by the enormous size of its mineral veins and surface values, which run far in excess of those found in other camps of the district. The camp itself may be reached by easy gradient, though surrounded by snow-capped mountains, as the mineral zone lies along the foot hills and near the river. The five leading claims of the camp, which may already be designated as mines, are the Banner, McKinley, Gloucester, Silver Queen and Pollard. The Banner shows six feet of high grade galena and copper ore on the surface, and where tapped by a 200-foot tunnel the lead is thirty-five feet wide. This will be the first claim in Franklin camp to ship ore. The McKinley and Gloucester will be close seconds, with their immense veins of pyrrhotite copper ore. The mineral-bearing belt, or ore zone, is eight miles long and five miles wide, and at this time of the year the sound of blasting continually reverberates through the hills from daylight till dark. Hundreds of prospectors, encouraged by the success of the above mentioned claims, are doing development work on their properties with the ever-present hope of "striking it rich," and before the summer wanes the list of assured mines will undoubtedly be more than doubled. Franklin camp is an ideal field for the prospector. His harder is supplied with venison and mountain trout with hardly an effort on his part. He shoots deer from the door of his tent in the early morning, and coaxes the king of fish from its torrid home for recreation after his day's work is done. He need not stint his camp fire, for wood is abundant, and rushing mountain streams are never out of hearing. His pack horses are never tempted

to "take the back track," for the open south hillsides furnish them bunch grass from which they do not care to stray. Of course, these matters are merely incidental to the business of prospecting, but they are incidentals which soften the rugged life, add a brighter tint to success and make failure more endurable.

SHIPMENTS ARE BEHIND

Capacity of Ore Fleet Curtailed by Delays.

Duluth, Minn., July 18.—With two and a half months of the season gone and shipments nearly 1,500,000 tons behind ore men are beginning to fear that it will be impossible to get down as much ore as in 1900, though the demand is greater than in any previous year. Vessels are unable to make the round trip from the head of Lake Superior to Lake Erie ports in less than ten days, though there are no blockades and delay, the trip should not take over seven to eight days. This curtails the capacity of the ore fleet. Perhaps 25 per cent of the tonnage of the upper lake facilities will be impossible. This means that several million dollars must be spent next winter at Cleveland, Erie, Conneaut, Ashabula and Fairport. The United States Steel corporation is buying the fee to mines on which it has leases when it can do so at reasonable figures. A part of the fee to the Negaunee mine has just been bought at a rate indicating a value to the mine of more than \$1,000,000, and now a deal is said to be possible for any corporation not possessing almost unlimited capital. Several other mines held under lease will be purchased outright soon. The purchase of the

Rockefeller properties carried with it the fee to the Mountain Iron mine, where in the past five years the predecessor to the United States Steel had paid in royalties the sum of \$1,250,000. Any further such payment has now been wiped out. Serious caves at Negaunee mine, Marquette range, have the past few days been carrying downward the surface, buildings, shops, etc., and injuring the workings. Orders to shut down Great Western mine, Menominee range, have been countermanded. From Saunoy mine, Mesaba range, they are shipping at the rate of 350,000 tons for the year. The Duluth board of equalization is now wrestling with the question of the taxation of stock piles. An ore body, said to contain, so far as now known, at least 5,000,000 tons, has been found on lands being drilled for the Eastern Minnesota road in section 28, township 58, range 20, and under option at \$50,000. It is reported locally that shipments from the Michigan range will fall short of earlier hopes and that not more than 300,000 tons will be shipped. The Clergue syndicate has ordered a ship to carry 6,500 tons ore to be built at the new Canadian shipyard at Collingwood, to be in readiness for next spring.

Rich Ore in Mikado.

A mill run of Golden Eagle ore has just been made and the gold cleaned up from the plates gave an average of \$3.53 of gold per ton. Development work is being continued on the property. The Rainy River Gold Mining company is arranging for some exploratory and development work on its property near the Mikado mine. During the past month the Mikado mine has been working in some exceedingly rich

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
