F. D. Kelsey Wins First Money and Silver Trophy. New York, July 20.—The second grand American handicap trap shooting tournament at inanimate targets was concluded yesterday at Interstate park, Long Island.

Sixty men, including W. R. Crosby of O'Fallon, Ill., took part in the trap shooting, breaking 90, but as there were only twelve moneys these had to shoot off for the last five prizes, with the result that Crosby shot 105.

Irrespective of the three handicaps during the tournament, 4,480 targets were shot at by the men who took part in all the sweepstakes. Of these Crosby broke 115, or better than 90 percent, a record of 16 yards. The next best aggregate scores were Gilbert, 407; Glover, 405; Banks, 397; Winchester, 397; Stearns, 394; Leroy, 392; Panning, 392; Latis, 389; Hood, 387; Sawin, 385; Wagner, 384; Rem, 384; Squire, 383; Heikes, Snow and Hawkins, 381 each.
