In hot weather the appetite is decayed by more suggestiveness more than desired for food; therefore one of the first articles of regular diet, meat, loses favor in our eyes, and we turn from it with distaste and seek something that does not hint at heat and discomfort. That all reasonable demands of the appetite may be humored we find at this season of the year our lakes and streams teeming with an endless variety of fish. The mere mention of fresh brook trout brings immediately to our mind the deep pool in some shady nook where these speckled beauties lie hidden and the imagination appeals to the appetite, which yields to the temptation. We had better be unto the dreamer of these mid-summer fancies if the reality falls short of the ideal, for there is nothing so unpalatable to the palate as fish that is not in the best and freshest condition. Fish, like the egg, must be above suspicion. Cooking Fresh Water Fish. These are best when they can be cooked by an open fire and as soon as possible after they are taken from the water. The nearest approach we can make to this primitive and delicious method is to broil, plank or pan them. Shad and whitefish are delicious cooked in this manner or broiled, and being delicate and free from the strong oils which abound in the richer varieties, they are also very fine stuffed and baked. Small fish may be garnished or fried. Vegetables and Garnishes for Fish. The proper vegetables to accompany fresh fish are potatoes, squash, green peas, uncooked cabbage. The large size are best planked, broiled or baked, and should be accompanied with suitable sauce. The medium-sized fish and small varieties should be fried or broiled. The garnishes for fish are, for planked fish, potato border, parsley and cut lemon, and for broiled fish, parsley, green peas, and cut lemon.
