**GERMANY MUST BUY**  
Reports of Crop Failure There Are Not Exaggerated.  
**SO SAYS A BERLIN IMPORTER**  
Gustav Berendt Confirms Telegraphic Reports and Shows Why They Are to Be Accepted.  
Gustav Berendt of Berlin, head of one of the most prominent German grain importing houses, was a visitor on "change" this morning. Mr. Berendt is here on business. He makes an annual run to America, but does not always come as far as Minneapolis. As to the crop conditions in Germany he was inclined to be conservative, but freely admitted that the American reports of German damage were in the main correct. He said: "I note that last year of the German crop has been the cause of much American newspaper comment for the past month both as to editorial comment and in the regular market reports. From personal knowledge, I can say that there has been great damage. The accepted estimate of the area plowed up, as not being worth the cutting, is 51 per cent. This is a matter which winter rye has suffered very severely. In Berlin grain circles it is the belief that Germany will have to import this year 100,000,000 bushels of wheat. This would be 40,000,000 to 45,000,000 more than the ordinary importations and would mean that much more to be figured out of the American surplus, in case we import this year from America, which is very probable, and yet not necessarily certain. It is probable the figures are conservative, as the Germans are a people not given to sensationalism or exaggeration, and inasmuch as they have to import the wheat to use it, I can say they are probably not going to make the home situation any worse in report than it really is."

HANDY WITH A KNIFE  
THE GJERTSEN DOCUMENTS  
Pastor and Deacons Discuss Plans for Considering the Documents.  
Rev. M. Falk Gjertsen met with the board of deacons of the Trinity Norwegian Lutheran church last evening, to discuss the coming congregational meeting, at which members will intro-submit the evidence recently secured from Norway relating to the Gjertsen scandal. The pastor of the church, who presided at the meeting, was opposed to receiving the so-called evidence, but nevertheless sought the advice of the deacons. There was a difference of opinion on this point and the matter was left undecided.

**OPIATES KILL THREE**  
A Trio of Deaths Caused in St. Paul by Poison.  
Poisons caused the death of three men in St. Paul yesterday. Dr. J. W. Ray, a dentist at Seventh and Jackson streets, died in his office last evening, from an overdose of morphine, to the use of which he had been addicted for several years. He had suffered from the heat and had taken an unusually large portion which caused his death. W. G. Allen's death was caused by a dose of the same drug taken Friday with suicidal intent. Mr. Allen had been a sufferer from cancer for several weeks and took the poison to end the pain. He died in the hospital last evening. Emil Daniels, St. Paul, died suddenly from an overdose of opium. He was employed by the St. Paul Lake Ice company.

**BOURNE CAN'T GET BAIL**  
He Must Provide \$8,000 Surety Before Being Released.  
It is now stated that Walter B. Bourne, former chief deputy auditor of Ramsey county, has been found guilty of fraudulent transactions by which the county is out of pocket over \$15,000. According to a statement prepared by Auditor Johnson, there are sixty-one separate instances of fraud discovered. Bourne is still in jail, having been unable to secure the necessary \$8,000 bail. But four warrants were presented by County Attorney Kane yesterday, but others are promised soon. The amount named by the county attorney as having been obtained fraudulently was \$3,635.52. Of this sum it is claimed \$442.92, \$324.25 and \$142.90 were secured by forgery in the second degree, \$1,443.52 by false audit, and \$821.94 by grand larceny in the first degree.
