September Lost 1-2c to Start, but Was Firm on the Lower Range, Closing at 68 3-4.

THE DROUGHT IS PARTLY BROKEN Clearances Over 1,000,000 Bushels, and Less Favorable Reports as to the French Crop.

Minnesota Chamber of Commerce, July 22.—Cooler weather over the northwest, some relief in the southwest country and lower cables were all against the price of wheat this morning.

Foreign support was the cause of the recovery in part. Chicago and St. Louis reported inquiry from France. Broomhall cabled that the first returns from the French threshing are disappointing.

Rains were reported over a scattered but extensive area. There were no very heavy rains. The northwest had a good wetting down, and Wisconsin and the country of Nebraska and Illinois were covered.

CORN ROAD STOCKS SHOOT UP
