

AS TO ARMY POSTS

Secretary Root Suspends the Work of Reorganization.

HIS ACTION CAUSES SURPRISE

Belief That the Suspension is Intended as Only a Temporary Measure.

New York Sun Special Service. Washington, July 26.—Secretary Root has suspended the order which he prepared for the appointment of a board of officers to look into the subject of a reorganization of the army posts of the United States.

Some sections have asked for the establishment of army posts, and reports received at the department show the necessity for the abandonment of others.

No explanation was obtainable at the War Department by the officials of the order to the adjutant general's office with the indorsement "suspended."

TAKES ISSUE WITH KOCH

Veterinary Surgeon on the Tuberculosis Bacilli.

Ithaca, N. Y., July 26.—James Law, director of the New York state veterinary college of Cornell university, gave out an interview in which he declared that he did not wholly agree with Professor Koch in his conclusion that bacillus which was found in cattle could not be transferred to human kind.

In regard to the dissemination of human and bovine tuberculosis, it is very clear that bacillus tuberculosis as grown or cultivated in the human body and bovine carries qualities that are characteristic of different habits, but that it is too early to take the absolute position attributed to Dr. Koch in a cablegram, that bacillus in one genus is radically different from that found in the other.

It has been shown that cultivation of human bacillus in codonion capsules in the abdomen of a chicken adapts itself after a time to the conditions of life in the fowl, and that it infects the fowl promptly and extensively.

KAISER AS MEDIATOR

Rumor That He Has Offered His Services Is Discredited.

London, July 26.—There is little foundation for the rumor that the German emperor has offered his services as mediator between the British government and the Boer leaders, with the object of bringing the war in South Africa to an end.
