

Woman's World LEARNING TO SEW

Council of Jewish Women Doing a Good Work.

EIGHTY LITTLE GIRL PUPILS

They Are in Various Stages of Proficiency and All Are Intensely Interesting.

The Minneapolis branch of the National Council of Jewish Women is conducting a sewing school in the gymnasium room of the Unity House social settlement on Washington avenue N. and over eighty girls are being initiated into the mysteries of the needle.

Many of the girls have been going to the school ever since it was opened and they set their stitches with the same regularity and haste according to rule. The older girls are making pretty underwaists, finishing with a full of lace. The middle-sized girls are sewing on skirts, red and white and blue and white striped petticoats while the youngest are making aprons, running tucks by hand and hemming the strings with joyful alacrity.

The children pay a penny apiece for the lesson and the teachers 10 cents for the privilege of teaching them. This fund is large enough to pay the running expenses and enable the child to carry home her work when it is finished.

There is only one lesson a week, on Wednesday from 10 until 12 o'clock in the morning, and when the noon strikes the children fold their sewing reluctantly. They like the work; it is a relief to them very womanly and grown up to sit in a chair and sew all morning, and though backs ache and fingers grow cramped, they are loath to go home.

Mrs. Emanuel Cohen is president of the local branch of the National Council of Jewish Women, and she is the active superintendent of the sewing school.

The gymnasium presents a busy picture on Wednesday mornings. Tables are placed along both sides of the long room and around them are gathered the busy little workers. There is no restriction in regard to religion or color and the Jew and the Gentile, the white and the black, learn to sew together.

CLUBS AND CHARITIES THE LABOR PROBLEM

Work for Women's Clubs Suggested in General Federation Circular.

The labor problem, as it relates to women and children, is a subject which will claim the attention of club women as soon as they come together in the fall.

The industrial problem as it affects women and children was never so complicated as at present. The very existence of the federation and of the clubs which form it is due to the fact that in the home of the wage-worker the women and children to work in factories, workshops, stores, offices and public service employment.

The Louisiana constitutional convention extended the suffrage to women in all cases where a specific public improvement is submitted to the property owners. All women owning property and paying taxes thereon are entitled to the same voting privileges as their husbands.
