en companies marching up and drawing in order. See that the other two battalions were sent to dislodge the first. Captain Gordon H. McNeil, Fond du Lac, additional paymaster, is an old-time guardsman. He served in the adjutant general's office during the administration of Generals Chapman and Burchard, and has for the past seven years been in the office of the secretary of state at Madison. Prior to that he served for eleven years as inspector of small arms practice in the Second regiment.

Colonel E. E. Tennant, governor's staff, is a visitor in camp. He has been connected with this regiment for several years, and was first lieutenant L. company, Second Wisconsin volunteers, during the late war. In civil life he is country treasurer of Ashland county.

General Joshua Hodgins, of Marinette, the new quartermaster general, is proving very popular. He succeeds General Albert Soliday. General Hodgins was made first lieutenant of Co. I, Second regiment in May, 1898, and served in same position in the volunteer service. He was promoted to be captain in July, 1898.
