BULL BEATS A CAR

He Didn't Like the Looks of the Headlight.

WHY THE COMO LINE WAS TIED UP

The Thick Necked Autocrat Deliberately Charged the Moving Car and Was Killed.

A bellicose bull, short tempered as well as short horned, frightened a car load of people almost out of their wits Saturday night, tied up the Como Interurban line for a space of two hours, and caused much needless profanity to be uttered.

When the animal first saw the car it was speeding toward Minneapolis, it was between Lake Como and the state fair grounds. He regarded it curiously for a moment and then, as the starting headlight approached nearer and nearer, he tossed his great neck, lashed his tail in anger and bawled the sound fiercely.

A second later he decided that such an effort to his dignity should not be permitted to go unopposed, and with his eyes glaring defiance he lowered his head and charged straight up the track.

Motorman Bradford saw him, but too late; and the infuriated animal dashed madly into the front of the car, smashing the offending headlight into a thousand pieces. He was caught by the fender, thrown to the tracks and instantly killed.

However, the shock threw the car from the rails for a distance of a hundred feet. It plowed its way through the yielding sand of the street, to an accompaniment of women's shrieks and started out from the male passengers. The car was loaded with people returning to Minneapolis after an outing at Como, and for a short time several of the women were on the verge of hysterics.

As it came to a standstill, however, their fears subsided. Later they looked over their shoulders with a light of a joke and were rather inclined to feel ashamed of their former terror.

When the train crew alighted to take an account of the damage done the car was found to be in a thousand pieces. They could do nothing until a wrecker arrived, and the first St. Paul bus was stopped and then sent on to Como to telephone for a wrecker crew.

Even with this assistance, however, the task proved no easy one, and it was a good hour and a half after the arrival of the wrecker before the big car was again placed on the rails. It was towed by a few men and a dozen cars were tied up by the accident, and traffic was entirely suspended.

The delayed passengers viewed the matter with good nature, many of them taking a keen interest in the work of the trainmen. In one car a pretty girl, in a front seat, called to the conductor. "I wish you would have the porter make up lower two," she said. "They tell me we may be here all night and I want to go to sleep."

WHOLESALE SCRATCHING

Dr. Bracken Advises General Vaccination Among the Workers.

Dr. H. M. Bracken, secretary of the state board of health, has issued a vaccination order of sweeping nature. It is not compulsory, however, but advisory. The important feature of the order is that it recommends that all employes of railroads, lumber camps or mines be vaccinated or present proof that they are immune to smallpox. The lumbermen will co-operate with the board this year and require vaccination as a condition of employment.

The order also recommends to school boards that vaccination be required of teachers and school children not already immune.

Dr. Bracken has appointed Dairy Commissioner McConnell and four of his inspectors to be state health officers. This will empower them to enforce sanitary regulations where they find nuisances existing.

Seven States Represented in the Two-Day Conference.

The following officers were elected yesterday by the semi-annual Minnesota conference of the Latter Day Saints held in Richmond hall. Walter C. Lyman of Chicago, president of the Northern States commission; John A. Sermon of Chicago, secretary of the Northern States commission; Francis M. Winters of Minneapolis, president of the Minnesota conference; Joseph B. Lloyd of Minneapolis, first counselor to the president.

Alba A. Stuart, Kilburn Hall and H. A. Johnson, Minneapolis elders, will return to Salt Lake City. The two-day conference closed last night. The next one will be held in February.

The Northern States commission, which embraces Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa, Manitoba, Indiana and Illinois, is presided over by 175 elders. These elders are appointed by the president of the church at Salt Lake City and hold office from two to three years. The local officers in each state are elected by their respective congregations.
