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THEY'RE A FAST LOT

Minneapolis Letter Carriers Have a Reputation for Rapid Walking. SO SAYS ST. LOUIS' POSTMASTER The Carriers Entertain Him With a Trip to Stillwater and a Smoke Social.

"I have always had a wholesome respect for this office and the St. Paul office and believe that these two cities are the most progressive in the United States in every way," said Postmaster Barnhoff of St. Louis last night at the meeting of the postoffice carriers in the assembly-room of the federal building last evening. Seventeen years ago Mr. Barnhoff inspected the Minneapolis office when he returned home made this report: "The letter carriers of Minneapolis are notable in appearance and walk faster than any set of letter carriers I have met in my travels."

Postoffice Innovations. Mr. Barnhoff said that he learned much from any postoffice which he visited. Whatever classes it contained were used, perhaps in one office, which, owing to conditions, might not be suitable for another. He mentioned several innovations which were being tested at St. Louis with the consent of the department. Suspension of carriers had been done away with. Good results have been obtained by changes. Carriers are changed to clerks when wanted, and clerks are changed from one division to another with beneficial results.

Members of the St. Louis party, Assistant Postmaster Howe of Watkeska, Wis., Superintendent Plummer, Campbell and Carrier Gordon made addresses also. The entertainment of Barnhoff and the party of ten from St. Louis by the committee from the Minneapolis Carriers' Association began yesterday with a trip to Stillwater on a private car. Postmaster Eaton and his party were taken through the prison by a special guide. Upon return to Minneapolis a fine dinner was served to visit the interesting state prison at Stillwater, to-morrow. STUDENTS WHO WORK

Boys Who Need Employment to Get an Education. A large proportion of the students at the state university are self-supporting. There are many who cannot attend unless they can secure employment while here. The Young Men's Christian Association of the university has maintained an employment bureau for several years through which a large number of men have been enabled to remain at the university. This year the number of applications for work is greater than ever and almost all of the applicants will be unable to enter school unless work is provided. 'PHONE AND TICKET

Chas. H. Grant Makes One Wire Double Duty. Experiments recently conducted by Charles H. Grant, assistant superintendent of telegraph of the Northern Pacific railway, have proved the feasibility of sending telegraphic messages over a telephone wire at the same time the instrument is being used to carry on a conversation. The trials were made between White Bear lake and St. Paul and are said to have worked perfectly, the telegraphic message not disturbing the telephonic conversation in the least. Mr. Grant makes use of a system of conducting coils and batteries which is his own invention and hopes to see the device in practical use before long over his company's wires.
