ILLINOIS CENTRAL BACKS A NEW ORLEANS-ROTTERDAM LINE.

Beneficial Effects as Far North as Chicago.

London, Aug. 16.—Arrangements have been completed for the establishment of a direct line of steamers between New Orleans and Rotterdam under the joint management of the Illinois Central railway and the Radcliffe steamship line of Cardiff.

Simultaneously the sailings of the London-Wisconsin line from New Orleans to London will be resumed after long suspension, due to the fact that the British government chartered the boats of the company as transports in connection with the Boer War.

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
