Team Owners

All team owners are expected to sign the labor day on horseback. Two hundred horses will be in line. After Sept. 1 the initiation fee will be raised from \$1 to \$2.50.

The United States Steel company, in its efforts to get competent men to take the place of the strikers, has sent to Minneapolis for some remaining members of the old Columbia Heights roller mill force. The men are wanted for the big mills at Pittsburgh. Only a few of the old crowd are in the city now, it is said, and none of them, it is claimed, can be obtained at any price.

Will Give a Loving Cup

The Palace clothing company will give to the labor organization making the finest showing in the Labor Day parade a fine silver loving cup. At the last meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, the award was given to the Gray, Alderman Fred Powers and Rev. J. S. Montgomery were requested to act as the judges. The cup will be presented in the show windows of the Palace company.

SHAMROCK TAKES A SPIN

Her First Trial in American Waters Is Satisfactory.

New York, Aug. 23.—Shamrock II got on her racing clothes for the first time in American waters yesterday, and gave a very satisfactory performance in New York's lower bay. Sir Thomas and Designer George L. W. Bates, both of whom were on board the yacht during her trial, expressed their delight with the result. Sailing about eight miles from the shore against a two-knot tide, she covered the distance in 57 minutes, and the reach back of six miles in 40 minutes. The wind was fresh and fairly steady from about south by east, and from 10 to 12 knots strength. The yacht carried main, sail, working topsail, forestaysail and jib. Her sails set remarkably well for the breeze on taut. The crew was in fine smooth water, except the last mile of the windward work, when she passed out by Coney Island point. Her pointing appears to be just as close as that of the Herreshoff boats.

New York, Aug. 23.—Columbia beat Constitution two minutes and five seconds on corrected time, and a minute and thirty-nine seconds on elapsed time performance in New York's lower bay course yesterday.
