AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND Control the Streets, Alleys, Sidewalks and Public Grounds Within the Limits of the Village of Deephaven.

SECTION I. No person shall obstruct the free use of streets or alleys of the Village of Deephaven with any material, or suffer any boats to be and remain on the shores of Lake Minnetonka, where the same is adjacent to or abutting any of the streets, alleys or public grounds of said village, or suffer any boats to be and remain in the streets, alleys or public grounds of said village, or suffer any boats to be and remain in the streets, alleys or public grounds of said village, or suffer any boats to be and remain in the streets, alleys or public grounds of said village.

Whoever shall violate or offend against or fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished by a fine not exceeding Five Dollars (\$5.00) and not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00) and costs of prosecution and be imprisoned until he or she has paid and paid, not to exceed sixty (60) days.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE AND Control the Building of Docks, Wharves, Boathouses or any other Obstruction Within the Limits of the Village of Deephaven.

SECTION I. No person or persons shall construct or build any docks, wharves, boathouses or any other obstruction of the streets, alleys or public grounds of the Village of Deephaven, with- in any manner other than as hereinafter defined, or shall build or construct any wharf, dock or boathouse, or any other obstruction, in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding Seventy-five (\$75.00) Dollars nor less than Five (\$5) Dollars and costs of prosecution for each of such offenses, or be imprisoned not exceeding sixty (60) days, or both, as the justice of the court shall determine.

PRESENTIMENT FULFILLED ENTHUSIASTIC IS HULL

STEAMSHIP DISASTER FORETOLD HAWKEYE ON THE PHILIPPINES

Assistant Engineer's Last Words to His Wife—He and Ten Others Perish.

Philadelphia, Aug. 29.—Eleven known dead, nine missing and thirty-two injured is the record made by the explosion of the boilers of the steamboat City of Trenton on the Delaware river yesterday afternoon. Of the eleven bodies that have been recovered, ten have been identified. The dead: John P. Chew of Camden, N. J., assistant engineer of the Trenton. Miss Elizabeth Green of Philadelphia, crushed to death. William Dunn, Philadelphia. Arthur Lansing, 14 years old, Trenton. James O'Connell, Mott Mable, Fremont; August Mable, deckhand, all of Philadelphia. William Nelson, 69 years old, of Hampton, Va. William H. Kern, passenger, Philadelphia. James McCormick, Wilmington, Del., passenger.

An unidentified body is so badly burned that its sex cannot be determined. Among the missing are Miss Ethel Stokes of Trenton and Miss Helen Brist, daughter of former Mayor John Brist of Trenton.

According to the statement of the widely known assistant engineer John P. Chew, he had a presentiment of death. Mrs. Chew says that before leaving home for work on Tuesday night her husband said to her: "I have a presentiment that there will be an explosion on the boat. If there is, there will be no one to rescue me. I am going to die."
