

Tillman Wouldn't Meet an Iowa Colored Man.

CHALLENGE FOR A JOINT DEBATE

R. D. Smith of Clinton, an Educated Negro, Rebukes the Southern Senator.

Clinton, Iowa, Aug. 30.—R. D. Smith of this city, is an educated man, a public speaker, a lucid writer and a man of good parts, but he is black. He is black as the coal fresh from the mines. He takes much interest in the welfare of the black man and is an admirer of Booker Washington.

Naturally when Senator Tillman, in a recent lecture, made derogatory remarks concerning colored people, Mr. Smith was hot. He at once issued a challenge to Tillman to meet him in joint debate at any time or place, north or south. Tillman in due time made answer, in the course of which he said he was not going up and down the land making speeches for fun, but had a set price, and moreover, if Smith could find a place where he could be engaged at a regular price, he had no objection to meeting him in debate. Then a thought seems to have struck Tillman, for he added:

"I presume of course that you are a white man, because I would not care to engage in debate with a man of color."

Mr. Smith in reply said:

"I am sorry to learn that you draw a color line. You would trample down a race whose poverty and misfortune have made you rich. I admit that the members of my race are not all perfect, but if you good people, who stole and brought us here, had spent as much time in trying to elevate us since 1619 as you have in using us, we would be the grandest, noblest race on the face of the earth."

In Labor's Field
A MONSTER PARADE

Labor Hosts of Minneapolis Will Turn Out in Force FOR MONDAY'S CELEBRATION

Line of March and the Order in Which the Various Unions Will Form.

Monday's Labor Day parade, it is calculated, will be the largest and most complete of its kind ever given in the state. It is estimated that there will not be less than 15,000 men in line, besides hundreds of teams. The parade will include many new and striking features in the way of uniforms and floats. It will start at 9:30, marching from Tenth street down Nicollet avenue to Bridge Square, up Hennepin to Tenth street, and then countermarching on Hennepin and Tenth streets to Nicollet.

thousands and the state is not large enough to supply the demand for them. The line of march will be two miles long, and the various unions finely uniformed. In conclusion, he recounts some of the practical benefits that have come to the working men through the efforts of these past few years.

Mr. Neary urges still stronger efforts toward organization and the extension of unionism. He asks that the present number of 25,000 union men in the state be increased to twice that number by next Labor Day.

NEW UNION POSSIBLE

The Plumbers' Troubles May Result in One.

The only recourse left the Plumbers' Union in their fight to keep the Master Plumbers' association intact, appears to be to work on the individual unions in the Building Trades Council to refuse to remain on jobs where non-union plumbers are employed. The Building Trades Council took the part of discretion this week by voting to take no part in the contest. It is thought that it is very unlikely that any of the unions will care to take up the plumbers' cause unless there is an agreement among the majority to co-operate in their behalf, and anything like full co-operation among the building trade unions is seemingly impossible at this time.

A possible result of the trouble will be the formation of another plumbers' union, to include the men employed by the seceding firms and any dissatisfied members of the present union.

In Honor of Mrs. Valish.

The committee appointed by the Trades and Labor Council to arrange a public mass meeting in honor of Mrs. Eva McDonald Valish, of Washington, has settled upon next Thursday evening as the time and the Lyceum theater as the place. Mrs. Valish will make the principal address of the evening. There will be other speakers and a program of music and reading. Mrs. Valish stands high in labor circles and for years was a valued worker in the local ranks, and it is planned to give her a notable reception.
