Woman's World AND WORMSHIP

Suggestive Exhibits Shown at Women's Federation Headquarters

NOVEL BIRDS' NEST COLLECTION

The Horticultural Society Auxiliary Work in Bird Preservation and Beautifying of Homes.

Some of the best and most interesting exhibits on the grounds are shown in the Women's Federation headquarters. None of these is entered in competition but they are shown simply for their educational value. Most of the articles shown are the work of women, and the exceptions are of special interest to women. Much of the work shown is along art lines and has been employed in decorating the building. The walls of the large, intersecting halls down stairs are lined with drawings, paintings and designs by the St. Paul School of Fine Arts. The walls of the hall and lecture room upstairs are lined with the work of the pupils of the Minneapolis School of Fine Arts. Robert Koehler, the director of the school, has several of his own paintings, "The Sowers," "The Willow Marsh," a picturesque spot on Rest Island in Lake Pepin, and a harvest scene.

In the room adjoining the lecture room upstairs is an art and crafts exhibit arranged by Mrs. W. A. Hall. The walls are hung with panels of burlap with border designs in color, lent by J. S. Gentry. The corner is occupied by specimens of Miss Bertha L. Corbett's art novelties. Two of Miss Elizabeth Chant's wall panels are shown, one of Vivian weaving the mystic charm that enthralls Merlin being painted, and the other, representing "many-towered Camelot" being an applique design on a textile panel. A part of the wall space is covered with articles in burnt leather. One large table is covered with industrial work from the Minneapolis vacation schools. This includes sloyd, raffa and rattan baskets and mats, specimens of rug weaving and hammock netting, and paper and raffa hats. This collection was made by Mrs. H. F. Brown. On another nearby table was a similar exhibit of basket and work from the Minneapolis public schools showing a more advanced stage of the work. This was sent by Miss Helen Maxwell who taught the industrial branches of the university. With the school work was an exhibit of small sample rugs woven on an adjustable hand loom recently patented by a Minneapolis woman, Mrs. M. P. Todd. Mrs. H. Holbrook shows several pieces of her work in painted and jeweled glass. Mrs. Mary Helmick and Miss Gertrude Leonard have carved wood in frames of the university. The art of Mrs. Chant's recent paintings adorn the walls and one of Miss M. E. Heisser's handsome painted screens occupies a prominent position. The art and crafts exhibit was used in illustrating the program given yesterday morning in the lecture room.

Down stairs were additional exhibits of art work, chiefly in burnt leather and wood and burnt leather, the workers in this line being Mary A. Whedon, K. H. Ellis, C. F. Howe, K. Maud Plum and Wallace R. Clarke. The burnt leather and wood work is in the large billiard room and on the walls is an extensive display of work in drawing and painting, composition and music from the St. Paul public schools.

Collection of Birds' Nests.
In the large arched corner alcove is one of the most interesting collections on the grounds, birds' nests shown under the auspices of the woman's auxiliary of the Minnesota State Horticultural society by Mrs. J. V. Hudson of Lake City who secured most of the birds' nests. Mrs. Hudson is present every day and it is her explanations that give the chief interest and value to the collection. She gives entertaining accounts of the habits of the birds whose nests are shown and the histories of the nests. Colored plates showing the birds add much both to the interest and value of the collection.

The purpose of the bird's nest display is to create an interest in birds and their habits which will in its turn foster a humane sentiment toward the songsters and harmless birds. Among the nests which give strong evidence of intelligence are those of Baltimore Orioles' nests. Those built near the habitations of men, where they were safe from birds of prey, have opened to the view of the public. In one was a bottle-shaped neck to prevent bird enemies from snatching the young birds from the nest. A robin's nest met with an accident that broke a large hole in the bottom of it. The bird promptly rolled up a soft pad of grass and laid over the hole and continued to use the nest.

There are two kinds of phoebe's nests, the one built in the woods, having mud and moss in its composition, while in the town other materials are used. Another wood bird uses birchbark in the wilds and replaces this with bits of newspaper about towns. Two rare nests, that of the blue gray gnatcatcher, a trail but beautiful affair of vegetable fiber covered on the outside with bits of lichen glued on, and that of the orchard oriole which builds its nest of green grasses in an oak bough, making it almost indistinguishable.

Bird Likes and Dislikes.
An interesting evidence of bird likes and dislikes is a section of the hollow of a small tree. A flicker discovered it and bored an entrance and made a nest which it occupied for several years. Two years ago a red-headed woodpecker saw the advantage of the hollow and thought there was room for another residence, so it made an entrance and a nest considerably lower down and now both birds dwell in the hollow tree in peace and amity. This year the English sparrow usurped the flicker's nest and also drove away the woodpecker, which did not like the sparrow for a neighbor.

Among the nests is that of a phoebe which deserted its nest, leaving the eggs, because a bee invaded it. Mrs. Hudson found the phoebe very interesting as examples of voracity in the young and industry in the parents, one pair she watched bringing food regularly every three minutes for the nestlings. A yellow bird's nest has a cowbird egg in it, but the clever little mother bird discovered the strange egg did not belong to her and abandoned her nest rather than hatch it out. The cowbird never builds a nest nor rears its young. It always intrudes upon other birds' nests, and its young take all the food provided by the foster parents and starve the rightful heirs. It is quite likely to impose in this way upon the indigo bunting and the goldfinch which always builds its nest in the fork of a thistle stalk, like a specimen shown. Two ground nests are shown, a meadow lark's soft loose oval mound of grass with the opening at the side that was plowed up in a field, and the brown thrasher whose nest in a corn field had husks for the outside.

COOKING SCHOOL HINTS

One cup of sauce means one cup of liquid, regardless of the amount of thickening and butter that you use.
A cup of butter means sixteen tablespoons. When we measure butter in a cup, we measure it packed solid.
A spatula is very nice for turning cakes, omelets and small fish.
Never leave a lemon or any acid jelly in a mold over night because it spoils the taste. Agate or earthenware molds are best.
If the gelatine in an earthen mold does not come out readily at first, set it in a dish of hot water for a minute, or wet a dish towel and set the dish on it. Be careful that it doesn't stay too long.
Always strain a custard, take out the spiral spring which balances the yolk in the white.
Dip smelts or fish of any sort in lemon juice when you wish to keep the flesh white.
If you keep parsley wrapped up in a piece of wet cheesecloth, you can keep it for several weeks without it spoiling.
When molding a cream mixture or gelatine mixture have a mold just the right size. It is not so apt to break when turned out as if the mold is too large.
