VISITORS AT CASS LAKE

MR. JONES AND SENATOR QUAILLES

Indian Schools and Government Dam to be Inspected—Some Surprises Encountered.

Cass Lake, Minn., Sept. 20.—United States Senator Quailles, of Wisconsin, chairman of the senate subcommittee on Indian affairs, accompanied by his secretary, T. W. Brahan, Indian Commissioner Jones, Colonel R. H. Platt, superintendent and the Carleton, Pa., Indian school, and several lesser lights are in Cass Lake.

The party is in charge of Captain W. A. Mercer, acting Indian agent at Leech Lake, who had previously prepared for their comfort while here, and will look after them on their various trips. The gentlemen will visit the Indian school at the Mission, about three miles from Cass Lake, and look over the country adjacent to the village. They will also inspect the school at Bena, and visit the government dam at Lake Winnibigashish.

Senator Clapp, Congressman Eddy and others who were intending to join the party here did not come on account of the death of President McKinley.

Senator Quailles stated that this was the only time Congressman Jones had for a trip to northern Minnesota. He stated that he was more than surprised at the advance made by Cass Lake since the north half of section 15 had been sold; that he was astonished at the resources which everywhere abound here. He had been given to understand that this immediate country was a "howling wilderness," fit for nothing but a home for Indians and wild beasts. He was of the opinion that from the fields of grain and vegetables he had seen the country was a banquet and campfire.

The visitors will leave Cass Lake for Red Lake on the 23d.

SWITZER OF IOWA CITY ELECTED PRESIDENT OF REGIMENTAL ASSOCIATION.

Iowa City, Iowa, Sept. 20.—The eighth biennial reunion of the Twenty-second Iowa regiment closed here last night with a banquet and campfire. The following officers were elected: President, J. C. Switzer, Iowa City; first vice president, E. J. C. Bealer, Cedar Rapids; second vice president, L. M. Godley, Ottumwa; third vice president, W. H. Needham, Sigourney; secretary, William J. Bowen, Iowa City; assistant secretary and treasurer, S. C. Jones, Iowa City. The next reunion will be held at Vicksburg, probably in 1903, and the comrades to make the trip south will charter a houseboat on the Mississippi.

HE FACED THE BOXERS

DR. AMENT TELLS OF THE CHINA

He Believes the Chinaman to Be the Coming Man of the Orient.

Rev. William S. Ament, D. D., brought a message from China to the General Congregational Association of Minnesota yesterday at the concluding session in the First church. Dr. Ament has the distinction of being the only white missionary who has addressed the boxers and not paid the penalty with his life.

Mr. Ament said that the boxer movement originated with religious fanatics—spiritualists who believed that each person was animated by some dead hero or sage, and that everything they did was right. Until the emperor dowager conceived the idea of encouraging the boxers and using them for her purposes, they had nothing against the Christians and had no disposition to do them harm. One of the deacons under Mr. Ament was compelled to stand by and see his wife burned after having her tongue torn out by the roots. His library was entirely destroyed and sixteen chapels burned.

The Chinaman, he says, is the coming man of Asia. He is the kindest, the most individual of them all, and is indispensable to any large movement toward civilization in the orient anywhere, not alone in his own country. Heathenism has hidden his intellect, but he is groping for the light. He has "unfaded nerves, a splendid physique, with unparalleled recuperative power, great patience, perseverance and a genius for business."

Resolutions of condolence were adopted by the association on the deaths of President McKinley and Bishop Whipple. Other resolutions provide that historical sketches of each local church be deposited

in the historical rooms at the state capitol.

A memorial was presented from the state W. C. T. U., asking the convention to consider the danger of the army canteen, make it a condition of church membership that the candidate be a total abstainer, and adopt systematic teaching of temperance in Sunday schools. The memorial was referred to the temperance committee.

The delegates to the anti-saloon convention at Washington, D. C., Dec. 5, are: D. C. Bell, Rev. Samuel Fisher, Luther Osborn, F. L. Hampson, Albert S. McMullen; alternates, C. M. Way, Rev. C. A. Buddock, James Plant, Rev. J. H. Sammis, Phillip E. Hamilton.

The association will meet next year at Ferguson Falls. The preachers will be Rev. E. B. Chase of Lake City, and Rev. H. P. Fisher of Crookston.
