Prompt Split in the Anti-Tammany Forces.

CITY DEMOCRACY STANDING OUT

Seth Low Nominated for Mayor by the Republican Party and Citizens' Union.

New York, Sept. 25.—A movement for a third city ticket with Colonel Edward M. Knox as a nominee for mayor has been launched by the executive committee of the city democracy.

Mr. Low, who last night was nominated by the republican and citizens' union conventions, is quoted as saying: "As soon as I receive official notice of my choice, I shall gladly accept."

Mr. Low added that he had appointed John J. Clark as his campaign secretary. Mr. Clark was secretary of the citizens' union four years ago.

The republican city convention to nominate a mayor, controller and president of the board of aldermen last night was attended by most of the leaders of the republican party.

The platform adopted arraigns Tammany hall as "a band of conspirators against the public welfare, and as an organization devoted to public plunder."

The platform then scores the Tammany hall administration for its financial administration of the city, and charges it with filling the offices with Tammany workers.

After the adoption of the platform, Robert C. Morris gave the modification of the report of the conference committee which met with the representatives of the other anti-Tammany organizations, and formally named Seth Low, president of Columbia college, for mayor; Edward M. Groat, of Brooklyn, for controller, and Charles V. Fornes, of New York city, for president of the board of aldermen.

The convention adopted Messrs. Low, Groat and Fornes by acclamation.

The city convention of the citizens' union was held in Cooper Union, and was attended by over 2,000 people. There were 1,250 delegates. It was announced, as coming from Bird S. Coier, that he would not allow his name to be used as a candidate for mayor.

INDIANS ARE STARVING AT NOME

Miners Penniless After a Three-Year Quest for the Yellow Metal.

Port Townsend, Wash., Sept. 25.—According to reports from Nome brought by the steamer Oregon, the Indians of the place are threatened with starvation.

Destitute miners from outlying districts are arriving at Nome. The United States steamer Bear on Aug. 31 landed eighteen men at Nome. These men were found on the beach of Kotzebue sound, penniless and out of supplies.

The passengers returning on the Oregon report that the cable between St. Michael and Cape Nome is a failure. In several places the ice has cut the cable. It has been found that there are nine breaks. The gap was supplied with a new cable, but it has been damaged so as to be practically worthless.
