ANARCHY A FELON Radical Law Proposed by a New Jersey Bar Association. New York, Oct. 5.—The Hudson County (N. J.) Bar association at a meeting called to hear the report of its committee appointed to recommend legislative acts for the repression of anarchy, ordered the report referred to a special committee. The first section of the proposed act specifies: Anarchy shall be made a capital felony both as to the principals and accessories as well before as after the fact. The term "anarchy," for the purpose of this section, shall be taken to include every act done, or word uttered with intent to cause or incite others to cause the assassination of a president of the United States or any person in the line of succession; the governor of a state or any person in the gubernatorial succession or the chief of any foreign state or any person in the line of succession thereof. The second section provides that every person who, without intent to cause or to incite others to cause the assassination of the persons referred to in the first section, shall say or do anything with a view of maintaining or promulgating anarchistic doctrines, shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor.

SAVING MISS STONE Abducted Woman's Life in Great Jeopardy. VIGOROUS GOVERNMENT ACTION As European Brigands Always Keep Their Word, There is No Time to Be Lost.

New York Sun Special Service Washington, Oct. 5.—The United States government is taking vigorous action in the case of Miss Stone, who is held by Turkish brigands for a ransom. Of course there is no foundation for the rumor which comes from London, that the United States is preparing to send a fleet up the Dardanelles to intimidate the Turkish government. The officials of the state department are endeavoring to do, but it is known that they are using most energetic measures to save Miss Stone's life. There is no foundation for the rumor which has the amount of ransom reduced. The sum asked by the brigands was 25,000 Turkish pounds (about \$10,000). The time limit set by the brigands is Oct. 8, and all their demands must be met by that date. The Turkish brigands, the Turkish fish, Siellian and Grecian, have a reputation for carrying out their threats and putting to death their unransomed prisoners promptly on the day appointed by themselves. There is great anxiety concerning Miss Stone's fate. Officials here recall with a shudder an episode of 1870. A party of five men, including a minister from one of the smaller powers of Europe, a secretary of legation, a wealthy Englishman and an English peer, Mr. Muncester by name, afterward distinguished in the diplomatic service, visited the battlefield of Marathon, and in its neighborhood were captured by a band of Greek brigands and carried off to the mountains. A ransom of 25,000 pounds was demanded, and Mr. Muncester was permitted to return to Athens to arrange for payment of the money. He enlisted the Greek government, and a trap was set to catch the brigands at the place appointed for the transaction. The brigands had their spies at court and learned of the ruse in time to keep away from the rendezvous and to murder all four of the prisoners remaining in their hands.

ADAMS ILL AGAIN President of Wisconsin University Confined to His Room. Special to The Journal. Madison, Wis., Oct. 5.—President Charles Kendall Adams of the University of Wisconsin has been confined to his room for the past week. His private secretary, William D. Heistand, says his illness is nothing more serious than a severe cold which was contracted a week ago on the occasion of the president's address at the opening of the university, but it is rumored in student circles that it was necessary to administer morphine at least once the past two days to the distinguished scholar to get sleep. Dr. George Keenan, President Adams' physician, said in an interview that the patient was suffering from acute fatigue, and that he was confident he would be able to return to his office.

E. pulpit here for a few years, will accept a call to the pastorate of one of the large churches of Toronto, Ont.

COMING TO THE TWINS Marquisito Leaves the Coast Country for the Interior. Seattle, Oct. 5.—Marquisito, Japan's great political leader, leaves for the east to-day. He will remain several days in Minneapolis and St. Paul. The rest of his itinerary is unsettled beyond the fact that he will pay his respects to President Roosevelt in Washington.

HAS HE FOUND SILENCE? ANTI-NOISE CRUSADER IS DEAD Dr. Jones of Chicago Had Altogether Too Sensitive an Ear for This World.

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Dr. Samuel Jones, who in 1899, inaugurated an anti-noise crusade, declaring he would move every week in his life until he found a place in which he could enjoy peace and quiet in which Dr. Jones followed in the footsteps of a physician for thirty-three years in Chicago, was one of the city's best known practitioners. He had been identified with the city's hospitals and other institutions of the city and had gained an enviable reputation not only here, but throughout the country. In 1899, when the doctor began his war on noise, his friends held that it was only a hobby and that it would soon wear off. But the doctor spoke differently. In several lectures he contended that the racking of the nerves in consequence of the noise of a great city was a blow to the health and life as a blow to the body, and each time he announced his intention to do whatever was in his power to make that better place in which to live from the standpoint of a person who liked quiet. Dr. Jones accordingly interested some of the city fathers in ordinances which he suggested or drafted. It was long before there were ordinances bearing on the subject of noise which gave the police extended powers in dealing with the noise of the city. In the city it was the rumbling of wagons, the shouting of peddlers, the ringing of the bells and the shrieks of the whistles that distracted the nerves of the city dwellers. There were chickens, dogs, cats, and other noise-producing animals, and there was no way he could control their voices. Once he had purchased a number of chickens which he set in the morning and not at all on Sundays. Still, the doctor did not find the quiet for which he sought. He moved from place to place, from the suburbs and back to the city, but all to no avail.
