**IN A NUTSHELL**

Omaha—Children playing in a clay bank unearthed 815 bogus half dollars and crumblers and molds used by counterfeiters.

Wahoo, Neb.—Fourteen feet of bituminous coal, in two veins, ten feet apart, with slates and sandstone intervening, has been discovered at Swedeborg.

Washington—The postoffice department has decided to place the late President McKinley's head on the new issue of postal cards, which will appear shortly after Dec. 1.

La Salle, Ill.—The body of Mrs. Sealey, the account known as Lillian Sealey, was found in the Illinois river four miles west of here. Several days ago the woman ascended from La Salle.

Helena, Mont.—For three hours last night William Bailey ran amuck, shooting D. D. Fowler, but not seriously, and threatening the life of Miss Rose Johnson and others. He is now in jail.

Port Townsend—Another evidence of the determination of the Chinese to evade the exclusion law was brought to light by the capture of a sloop with four Chinamen on board, a few miles south of Port Planger.

Pittsburg—The trustees of Carnegie institute have adopted plans for the erection of one of the largest and most complete schools of technology in the world. Carnegie will be asked to give at least \$5,000,000 for maintenance.

Buffalo, N. Y.—The balloon race from the stadium of the Pan-American exposition grounds between Professor Charles Litchfield of Boston and Leo Stevens of New York, for a purse of \$3,000, was won by the Boston aeronaut. Litchfield's balloon ascended 200 feet higher than did Stevens.

Ottawa, Ont.—A movement is under way for the entry of the northwest territory into the confederation as a full-fledged province. Frederick W. Haultain, attorney general and treasurer of the territory, and L. A. Sifton are at the capital conferring with the Dominion authorities on the subject.

Washington—General Miles says: "There are many transactions in Mr. Alger's administration of the war department as rotten as beef pulp in the can. I don't care to say anything on the subject now. Whether I will deem it necessary to make a reply or not is a question. At present I shall certainly say nothing."

New York—The annual meeting of the Western Union Telegraph company was held here yesterday. Stuyvesant Fish and Samuel Spencer were elected to the directorate. **VARICOCELE WEAK MEN BLOOD POISON PRIVATE DISEASES**

**BEATEN BY REBELS**

Macabebes Fight Filipinos for Two Hours.

**AMERICANS HAD TO WITHDRAW**

Entire Police Force of a Philippine Town Carried Off by Bolomen.

Manila, Oct. 10.—A detachment of the Twenty-first company of Macabebes today encountered a large force of insurgents near Lipa, province of Batangas. Lieutenant Beary of the Macabebes was killed and one of the force wounded. The enemy was strongly entrenched. After two hours' fighting the Americans retreated to await reinforcements. The Macabebes numbered over 200, were armed with Remington and Mauser rifles, and apparently had plenty of ammunition.

Martin, a teacher at Mauban, was captured by insurgents while visiting a neighboring town under an escort of native police. The next day his captors, resenting, tied him in a hammock and carried him to a point within a mile of the town and released him, saying he was a non-combatant.

The entire police force of Catanga, province of Tayabas, numbering eleven, have been carried off by insurgents armed only with bolos. Presumably the police made no resistance, though they were well armed with carbines and revolvers.

**Will Replace Troops.**

Washington, Oct. 10.—It has been determined at the war department to send troops to the Philippines to take the places of those whose terms of enlistment expire. Where the re-enlistments are not large in any one regiment, their places will be filled by separate detachments of recruits. A considerable number of enlistments expire in a single organization it is probable that the organization as a whole will be returned from the Philippines and another regiment sent to take its place.

**ARMY YEAR IN CUBA**

GEN. WOOD TURNS IN A REPORT

Inspector General Burton Evidently Thinks the Abolishment of the Canteen Was Unwise.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The war department has made public the annual report of Major-General Leonard Wood, commanding the department of Cuba, for the last fiscal year. The report deals with military affairs entirely. General Wood says the general conduct of the American troops in Cuba continues to be excellent, and, heretofore, complaints against them from civil authorities and individuals are extremely rare. During the past summer five officers of General Wood's staff were taken ill with yellow fever and three of them died. Among the headquarters employees there were forty-eight victims to yellow fever, with eleven deaths. General Wood devotes a good part of his report to a statement of the results attending the tests of the artillery in fortifications left by the Spanish.

The old canteen issue is revived in this report through a substitute report furnished by Inspector General Burton. He says that the exchange is a great comfort to the soldier in Cuba, who is deprived of many of the comforts known to him at home. The officers generally complain that the elimination of beer from the exchange has worked a hardship on the soldier and has been detrimental to good order and military discipline. General Burton recommends certain changes in arms and a complete revision of the military drill regulations, which are severely criticized.

**TREATY WITH CHINA**

RIGHTS OF AMERICAN EXPORTERS

Mr. Sharrett Talks of His Forthcoming Work in Revising the Chinese Tariff.

New York, Oct. 10.—Thaddeus S. Sharrett, one of the general appraisers of the customs, has been empowered by the administration to take part in revising the Chinese tariff and to arrange a new commercial treaty between China and the United States, will leave for San Francisco next Tuesday. Whence on the 1st. He will sail for Shanghai. Before leaving Baltimore he said:

"The credentials handed me by the government give me full power to treat with China and the allied nations interested in the indemnity, in the revision of the Chinese tariff. I have been requested to secure for the exporters of the United States all the rights and privileges that may be accorded to any other nation. In addition to revising the tariff and changing it from an ad valorem to a specific basis, I have been informed that I probably will be required to serve in conjunction with Minister Gresham as a commissioner to arrange a new commercial treaty with China. It will be necessary for me to go to Peking to present my credentials to the Chinese government. The commission, however, will meet in Shanghai."

**MINNESOTAN ON DIVORCE**

Address That Holds the Attention of the Purity Congress.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—Vice, its cause, effect and remedies were discussed in papers and addresses delivered at to-day's session of the National Purity convention.

Owing to the action of the house of bishops of the triennial Episcopal convention at San Francisco in forbidding Episcopal ministers from solemnizing marriages before "any man or woman divorced by any court," a socialist candidate for the judgeship of Winnebago City, Minn., received marked attention. His address was entitled, "Divorce not a matter of church," and in a philosophical vein he mustered facts in support of his text.

**HARBOR OF MANILA**

A \$2,000,000 Dredging Contract Is Awarded a Seattle Concern.

Seattle, Oct. 10.—President Fowler of the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging company, a Seattle corporation, has been notified that his firm has been awarded the government contract valued at \$2,000,000 for dredging the harbor of Manila and completing the old Spanish breakwater.

The contract was awarded to the company after a long and competitive bidding process. The necessary dredging machinery and a million feet of lumber to be used in constructing coffer dams on which to carry the masonry for the breakwater to its position. Two working crews will shortly be shipped to Manila from this city.

**WILL BUILD MEMORIAL ARCH**

Association Formed to Build Monument to McKinley.

Washington, Oct. 10.—At a meeting held at Masonic Temple under the auspices of the National Memorial Bridge association there was organized the William McKinley National Memorial Arch association, of which District Commissioner H. B. F. MacFarland was chosen president and Lyman J. Gage, the secretary of the treasury, treasurer. The object of the association is to raise funds with which to construct a memorial arch to the late president at the Washington side of the proposed memorial bridge across the Potomac.

**TO INVADE COLOMBIA**

VENEZUELA GOING AT IT AGAIN

Castro May Be Deterred by Uprisings Against Him, Which Are Becoming Thicker.

La Guayra, Venezuela, Oct. 10.—Venezuela is planning another invasion of Colombia. Troops are being organized at Maracaibo under the command of General Vicente G. Sanchez, commanding the Venezuelan garrison at that city. They are expected to land in an expedition of about 3,000 men at Fajardo, near the port of Rio Hacha. Castro is determined to capture Rio Hacha at any cost as a basis for operations upon the coast. Other revolutionary movements are expected. Because of these conditions it is believed Castro will be compelled to abandon his aggressive and disastrous policy.

Aberdeen, S. D., Oct. 10.—C. B. Collins of Groton, this county, has announced his candidacy for state treasurer before the republican state convention of 1902. Mr. Collins is well known throughout the state and has many friends.

W. E. Kidd, who claims to be a socialist but who is also chairman of the fusion executive committee which has the judicial campaign in charge in this circuit, was opposed to the nomination of a socialist candidate for the judgeship. He was chairman of the socialist convention and urged that since socialists are opposed to courts as at present constituted, they were in duty bound not to place a candidate in the field under the "present order." A majority thought otherwise and nominated George W. Craile.

**BLACK HILLS OUTPUT**

Estimate of \$18,000,000 Is Much Too High.

Deadwood, S. D., Oct. 10.—Conservative mining men take exception to the report sent out that the output of gold from the Black Hills for this year will be \$18,000,000. It will do well to make \$12,000,000. This would be an increase of about three millions, which is considered good. Next year a much larger output will be made for the reason that new plants built this summer and those in course of construction will have been at work long enough to commence to bring in results. The estimate of twelve millions output for the year is made by members of the faculty of the State School of Mines at Rapid City after a thorough investigation.
