## ABOUT 300 THERE

Presbyterian Synod of the State Meets at Albert Lea.

## ANNUAL SERMON BY DR. CARVER

Rev. Dr. Dixon Addresses the Anniversary Meeting of Woman's Missionary Society.

Albert Lea, Minn., Oct. 11.—The first session of the annual meeting of the Presbyterian synod of the state was held in the Presbyterian church last night and although the weather was anything but favorable, the attendance was good. There are about 300 delegates and visitors present. The exercises last night consisted of a prayer, the reading of the minutes and the annual sermon by the moderator, Rev. Dr. Carver of Brainerd. The address was a strong one, and kept the attention of all.

If the weather permits there is to be a carriage drive tendered by the citizens this afternoon and at 5 o'clock the delegates will be entertained at Albert Lea. The faculty and students to unite in the entertainment of the visitors. The college this year will receive much attention from the synod, and it is hoped conditions will be better understood. At 9:30 this morning the sixteenth annual meeting of the synodical society of the Woman's Home Missionary Workers was convened, and the attendance was large. The president, Mrs. Momeny, presided, and after a devotional service, conducted by Mrs. Carver, the address of welcome was delivered by Mrs. R. B. Skinner of this city, who made some pertinent and appropriate remarks. After the reading of the minutes, the subject, "Our Work," was taken up and considered by Mrs. Ell Torrance, Mrs. S. M. Davis, Miss A. E. Burns and Mrs. H. W. Coffin. Then an adjournment was taken for dinner and in the afternoon the first subject was "Porto Rico," by Miss Inez Godard. This was followed by a solo, "The Mormon Menace," by Rev. N. E. Clemenson, after which the offering was taken and the address of the meeting was delivered by Rev. Dr. John Dixon, secretary of the First Presbyterian church in Mankato, and arrangements for the event are being perfected here while the synod is in session.

Albert Lea, Minn., Oct. 11.—Rev. A. B. McArthur was chosen temporary moderator over Rev. F. W. Frasier of Crookston, the vote standing, Meldrum, 44; Frasier, 41. Rev. Mr. Johnson of Willmar was chosen temporary clerk. The remainder of the time this forenoon was taken up with routine business, and the first work this afternoon was the consideration of Macalister and Albert Lea colleges, after which an address upon "Are Presbyterians Generous?" was delivered by Rev. Mr. Bushnell.

## SYNOD OF NORTH DAKOTA

Annual Presbyterian Meeting in Progress at Grand Forks.

Grand Forks, N. D., Oct. 11.—The Presbyterian synod of North Dakota opened yesterday with an attendance of upwards of seventy-five ministers and laymen. More delegates arrived by last evening's train, bringing the number up to over the hundred mark. Rev. Thomas Dougan presided at the opening session. Rev. T. D. Acheson of Park River was elected moderator, and Rev. H. Meyers of Emerald temporary secretary. A sermon was delivered by Rev. J. S. O'Brien of Grand Forks. At the afternoon session a report was received from Rev. A. C. Brown, synodical missionary, showing that much progress had been made. The evening meeting was devoted to an address by Rev. Dr. Hasley of New York. He described his work in various parts of the world during the past ten years.

## Mankato Presbytery.

Lakelief, Minn., Oct. 11.—The Mankato Presbytery, which has been in session in this place since Tuesday was brought to a close yesterday afternoon. About forty preachers were in attendance, representing eighteen counties in the southern and eastern part of the state. On Tuesday evening Rev. Mr. Schlosser, of St. Peter, the retiring moderator, preached an excellent sermon, after which Rev. Mr. Hood, of Marshall, was elected moderator for the ensuing year. On Wednesday evening Rev. Mr. Davis, of Mankato, and Rev. Mr. Connell, of Pipestone, delivered two popular lectures. Most of the preachers left for Albert Lea to attend a meeting of the synod.
