CUBAN ELECTIONS

Date Changed to Feb. 24—Some Changes in Qualifications. Havana, Oct. 15.—To-day Governor General Wood promulgated the election law. Several changes have been made in the draft. Provision making it necessary for unscrupulous Spaniards to secure from the secretary of state a document showing themselves eligible to vote has been stricken out. Instead of the constitutional convention taking charge of the elections a central board of scrutiny will receive and transmit to the governor-general full reports as to all matters pertaining to the elections. Upon receipt of the complete returns Feb. 24, the governor-general will announce the date for the assembling of the Cuban congress, the proclamation of the president, vice president, and formal transfer of the government of the island, the government to be established. The date of the elections has been changed from Dec. 31, 1901, to Feb. 24, 1902. The presidential and senatorial elections will assemble in the capitals of the provinces to elect the president, vice president and senators.

IN A NUTSHELL

Tunnelton, Va.—By an explosion in a mine here thirteen miners were burned, five probably fatally. Washington—Senator Frye says that Senator Calum will succeed the late Senator Davis as chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations. Louisville—Henry Watterson has announced himself a candidate for governor in 1903, and is understood to desire the democratic nomination for president in 1904. Victoria—Henry Gill of the Royal Engineers is a prisoner in the provincial jail, charged with the murder of Gunner Clinch of the Royal artillery. Gill said he intended the shot for another man in the cabin. Washington—Colonel William M. Van Horn, commanding the Twenty-eighth infantry, with headquarters at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, has been recommended for retirement. Physical disability is the cause of the board's recommendation, but Colonel Van Horn insists that there is nothing the matter with him. Disaffection is said to have been expressed by General Otis with the character of the discipline maintained at Fort Sheridan. Washington—Rear Admiral Evans left for San Francisco, whence he will accompany Rear Admiral Casey, commanding the Pacific station, on the flagship Wisconsin to Tutuila, Samoa. Admiral Casey is charged with the investigation of certain allegations made by missionaries in Samoa against the moral character of Captain B. F. Tilley, naval governor of Tutuila. In case it should be found necessary to order a naval court for the trial of Captain Tilley, Rear Admiral Evans will be appointed president of the court.

WISCONSIN

CHIPPEWA FALLS—Daisy Peck, a 12-year-old inmate of the home for feeble-minded, was drowned in the Chippewa river. WEST SUPERIOR—No trace has been found of the laundry driver, Clarence Johnson, who disappeared over a week ago. MILWAUKEE—Anton Stollenwerk is missing and his friends fear he has been foully dealt with. He left for St. Louis on Oct. 1. BARRON—Five cases of smallpox are reported. The board of health burned the residence formerly occupied by the Hoover family. STEVENS POINT—The Kuenzel brewery has been sold to a syndicate headed by Michael Little, of Green Bay. The syndicate will increase the capacity of the plant. The price paid was \$18,000. WAUKESHA—In the circuit court, Grace Snell Walker, who was recently divorced from Manager James C. Walker, of the Pountain House, petitioned for permission to again wed. It is said she wishes to marry Frank Coffin, of Chicago, from whom she has twice been divorced. BLACK RIVER FALLS—The Indians near here are in a deplorable condition of destitution this fall, and are all objects of charity. The smallest quarantine was started just as the blue berry season began. Then they were not allowed to work husking corn and digging potatoes as usual.

MINNESOTA

PRAIRIE DU CHIEN—Agnes Taublemann, aged 9 years, was burned to death near Eastman. She was boiling potatoes over a bonfire, when her clothing caught fire. ROCHESTER—As workmen were excavating a stone wall suddenly toppled and fell on Dennis Daly, Jr. He was removed to the hospital, where he died soon afterward. TWO HARBORS—Rain has fallen almost every day for the past three weeks, the season being the most disagreeable in the past four years, and, in consequence, all building, contracting and logging operations are seriously interfered with. DULUTH—The inquest of Thomas Grabagen, or Hogan, who was killed Sunday morning, was held yesterday afternoon. The jury found that he came to his death from a knife in the hands of Patrick Rivers. CENTERVILLE—Frank Brannan, proprietor of the Barker hotel at Promiss City, Iowa, is in custody for horse stealing. VAIL—Charles Knowles, aged 12, son of John Knowles of the Greenway Lumber company, was run over and fatally injured by a gravel train. OSKALOOSA—S. J. Dutton, a merchant for thirty-five years, has made an assignment. The liabilities amount to \$6,388, and are covered by chattel mortgages on the stock which will pay out. WATERLOO—The remains of the man found on the Illinois Central track east of this city have been identified as those of William Carter of Algona. He was a truant in the asylum and had wandered away. RED OAK—At the Mike Elmore grating camp, on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy east of Stanton, a train consisting of several dump cars broke through the trestle work. John Sernet was instantly killed, A. Welch was fatally injured, and three others badly hurt. BURLINGTON—The State Library association selected Grinnell as the place of holding the next meeting. The following officers were elected: President, F. F. Dowler, Cedar Rapids; vice president, C. M. Crapo, Burlington; secretary, Miss Margaret Brown, Des Moines; treasurer, M. H. Douglas, Grinnell.
