

### Northwestern Mines A COPPER MOUNTAIN

Great Consolidation Scheme in Washington State.  
NORTH DAKOTA MEN ARE IN IT  
Company Would Corral All of Palmer Mountain—Ten-Mile Tunnel Proposed.

Special to The Journal. Spokane, Wash., Oct. 18.—One of the biggest mining propositions ever undertaken in the northwest is being pushed forward by John Boyd, managing director of the Palmer Mountain Tunnel company. He and his associates have a plan on foot to consolidate 1,061 claims, covering practically the whole of Palmer mountain, Washington.

The consolidation would include the Palmer Mountain tunnel group and hundreds of other claims. The promoters expect to incorporate at once under the name of the Palmer Mountain Mines Consolidated, for \$20,000,000 and they would offer \$10,000,000 in guaranteed 5 per cent gold bonds on the London market. Although Palmer mountain has been famous heretofore for its gold lodes, the promoters of the new enterprise expect to offer the property as a copper proposition.

Mr. Boyd and his associates have already formed a Washington Development syndicate, with a capital of \$1,000,000, to act as promoter and fiscal agent of the new company. The Development syndicate would own all of the stock in the Mines Consolidated. In the Development syndicate are H. R. Turner, secretary-treasurer, a lawyer of Fargo, N. D., and Clyde Preston, a farmer of Blanchard, N. D., who acts as vice president. Mr. Boyd is president. W. M. Robbins, a mining engineer of Chicago, is the consulting engineer of the company. Mr. Robbins is at the Hotel Spokane on his way east after spending the summer at Palmer mountain. He said last night:

Our proposition is the biggest ever planned in the northwest, save for the consolidation of the Butte copper properties. During the past four months I have secured control of 1,061 claims on Palmer mountain for the company. Of them about 250 are properties which we have secured under one year's bond. No cash payment has been made. The other properties, numbering about 800, I have had located by a crew of twenty men during the summer. The claims stretch from Loomis to Oroville in one continuous body. The present Palmer mountain tunnel, which has been driven for a mile, will be continued nine and a half miles further until it comes out at Oroville. There we shall erect a 150-ton smelter to treat the ore. I took about 250 samples of ore and got copper values. The mountain is really a vast deposit of copper ore, and it will be most profitably worked for copper.

We have secured bonds outright from the Bull Frog, the Spokane, the Ivanhoe and the Webe Consolidated companies, besides I have also the property of the late C. C. May of Davenport, who control the Palmer Mountain Tunnel company, that they will secure a bond on that property for the Washington Development syndicate. Our bonds represent an investment of over a million dollars down to a few hundred dollars. In the aggregate, they form an immense sum.

The financing of the new company is already assured. We shall offer \$10,000,000 in guaranteed 5 per cent gold bonds, on the London market. The bonds will run for forty years, and the principal will be paid in \$1,000,000 in dividends. The company has purchased a new diamond drill outfit, and it is expected a good copper-bearing lode will be encountered.

The lode recently encountered at the Old Colony property with the diamond drill will be thoroughly explored. The company propose to sink a vertical shaft. The Allouez Mining company has filed new articles of incorporation, the old company having been organized thirty years ago. Recent reports that the Baltic lode had been struck in the exploratory shaft on section 18 are well founded.

Work on the lode encountered at the Mayflower property through a test pit will commence shortly. It is thought the lode is one of the best in the lake district. Pickands, Mather & Co., who have an option on the Penn property, are rushing exploratory work. The two shafts have been cleaned out; one is down 100 feet and the other about 70. About twenty-five men are employed under the direction of Captain Dunn.

**AFTER BOUNDARY GOLD**  
Monx City Men Buy Seventy Acres and Have Good Prospects.  
Special to The Journal. Nat Portage, Ont., Oct. 18.—A party of Sioux City, Iowa, capitalists recently visited this district for the purpose of examining a property near Dryden. As a result they have purchased seventy acres near Dryden on which some very promising outcrops appear. On one vein from a test pit six feet deep rich specimens of ore were taken, and it is the intention of the visitors to immediately organize a company and proceed with the development of the property.

H. D. Alston of Wabegon has returned from a trip to Minneapolis, St. Paul and other centers, and states that he succeeded in performing a syndicate to purchase and develop a property on Upper Manitowish lake. He has already commenced work on a promising vein of gold ore.

N. C. Westerfield of the Westerfield Mining and Development company, was here this week in connection with the development work being done by his company on Flint lake and Eagle lake properties.

**NORTHERN MINNESOTA MINES**  
Genon's Steam Shovel Damaged—Burn Out of Commission.  
Special to The Journal. Eveleth, Minn., Oct. 18.—The Genon mine has reduced shipments on account of damage to the steam shovel, and on account also of the rains and consequent delay at docks. Both have also been somewhat behind schedule and this may be expected more and more from now on.

The development of the Shenango property, bought last spring by the Shenango Iron company at \$500,000 from Messrs. Kinney, Howe & Washburn of Duluth, has commenced with Captain Trezona in charge. There is a 100,000-ton annual minimum with a 20 per cent royalty to James McCall of Duluth. The property contains a large body of high grade and physically fine bessemer ore.

The Auburn mine will probably ship this year about 500,000 tons, far more than it has ever sent out in any year. In 1899 it produced 350,000 tons, which was its biggest year. The Auburn made a wonderful record for hoisting last month, raising through its single shaft 80,965 tons. The shaft is equipped with a pair of five-ton skips running in balance. The mine is a milling proposition, and ore is run to the shaft on a belt line road and trammed by hand. The mine is now out of commission on account of an accident to one of its hoisting engines a few days ago. Almost the entire product of the Auburn is the result of the season of navigation, as a very small stock was accumulated last winter.

**LIME ORE GOLD**  
Splendid New Cyaniding Proposition in the Hills.  
Special to The Journal. Lead, S. D., Oct. 18.—Another rich strike of lime ore has been made at the west of Ragged Top and is developing into one of the best propositions in that lively district. The ore is in a flat shoot something like twenty feet thick and of unknown length and width. It is a great blanket spread over the surface. The assay values run from \$8 to \$14 a ton gold and the tests that have been made show it to be an excellent cyaniding proposition. The discovery shows that this lime formation, which is attracting so much attention among Colorado men, is more extensive than at first thought. The new strike is three miles west of the Spearfish company's plant on Iron creek. Already a deal is on for the ground in which Colorado capital will figure.

Ragged Top will soon have a second cyanide plant in operation, the buildings for which are already enclosed and the machinery being installed. W. O. Morrison and associates, of Colorado City, Colo., associated with Ed Hanschka, of this city, are building the new plant.

It is said the owners of the Big Four mine four miles west of this city, in Deadwood gulch, are contemplating the erection of a 100-ton cyanide plant at the mine. A vein of \$5 ore has been opened up.

The little 25-ton cyanide plant at Central City, formerly worked by the Dakota company, is now running on ore from the Cornucopia mine, near Portland.

**NO TROUBLE TO SELL STOCK**  
Hidden Fortune Company Has All Kinds of Good Ore.  
Special to The Journal. Lead, S. D., Oct. 18.—The Hidden Fortune Mining company, of Denver, which is being promoted by H. J. Mayhew and others, has an estimated gold reserve of \$7,000,000. This is all on the upper contacts, being the cement and siliceous ores, which run in values from \$5 to \$40 a ton gold. Otto P. Th. Grant, who discovered the Hidden Fortune ore, has in the past six months taken out about \$40,000 of this surface ore not more than fifteen feet below the grass roots. In the Harrison mine, on the south end of the ground overlooking this city, there are half a dozen shoots of ore that run better than \$75 a ton gold.

There is a 50-ton cyanide plant in operation at the Golden Crown mine and ore is being taken out of the Durango mine. But the real values are going to be found in the slates which underlie these upper contacts. **\$15,000 IN DIVIDENDS**  
Bald Butte Mine Gives Returns—Lind's Company Developing.  
Special to The Journal. Helena, Mont., Oct. 18.—The Bald Butte mine declared its regular dividend of 6 cents a share amounting to \$15,000, which week the stock is held largely by Helena people. A sale of 1,300 shares was made this week for \$4.85 a share. The Bald Butte has been a steady dividend payer for about twelve years. The original strike in the new Greenhorn district, ten miles west of Helena, the Red Bird, owned by Dick Panches, has been sold to a New York syndicate by Carl Kleinschmidt of Helena. A third interest in the Christina claim in the same district, owned by the Christina Mining company of Helena, of which R. A. Bell is president, has been purchased by Spokane people for \$10,000.

A rich strike of cyanide ore has been made in the New Year Gold Mining company's property in Fergus county, which St. Paul people control. The mine is equipped with a complete cyanide plant of the latest improved pattern. The news of the find is confirmed by R. K. Neil, manager of the famous Kendall mine in Fergus county, who was in Helena this week. A Chicago syndicate has purchased a group of thirteen copper claims on Stone creek, Beaverhead county. A group of copper properties in the Snowshoe district, a short distance west of Helena, are to be developed by a new company organized by Indianapolis people. A contract for a 700-foot tunnel and a deep shaft will be let at once.

Ex-Governor Lind's Minnesota company, which is developing the Grey Eagle mine, is drifting on the 575-foot level. There is a quantity of good ore in sight. The Eva May, in the Cataract district, is preparing to sink another 100-foot tunnel. Hamil & Edwards are working a large force of men reopening the old Panyan property. Some very high-grade ore has been produced from the Panyan. The Ada mine, in the Cataract district, is shipping two carloads of high-grade copper ore a day to the smelters at Butte.

The officials of the American Smelting and Refining company, consisting of Daniel Guggenheim, chairman of the board; Vice President Barton Sewall of New York; August R. Meyer, Anton Eilers, Simon Guggenheim of the executive committee, Leon P. Eastman and Edgar L. Newhouse of the western executive committee; S. W. Eccles, general manager of the company's traffic department, and S. W. Gutterman of Denver, are in Helena on a tour of inspection of the company's plants. Ex-Governor Grant of Colorado, also a member of the executive committee, recommended certain additions to the plant when here several weeks ago. It is rumored that the visit of the officials will result in the immediate starting of work on these new additions.
