### REMORSE AND POISON

#### Woman and Companion Attempt Suicide, the Former Dying.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—While grieving over the dual life she was leading with Dr. L. Burnette, a prominent Chicago dentist, Mrs. Charlotte Nichol, wife of W. L. Nichol, Jr., the commercial agent of the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railroad, committed suicide in the Marlborough hotel. Burnette also tried to end his life at the same time, but was unsuccessful.

The two were found in their room, both stretched across the bed, the woman dead and Burnette with his neck pierced with a hat pin, a bottle of morphine clutched in his hand and the gas turned on from every one of the six jets in the suite. Dr. Burnette is still alive and has been arrested.

In one of the rooms was found a note written by the woman which told her reason for the act. She said:

"To whom it may concern: I did it because I loved him better than anything on earth and he loved me and we could not be separated.

"Good bye, —Charlotte."

The note, supplemented with a statement made by Dr. Burnette, tells of the tragedy enacted by the two lovers.

#### LA FOLLETTE HIMSELF AGAIN

### SAYS HE'LL SHOOT

#### A Pot Hunter Threatens Game Warden Fullerton.

#### GOT PINCHED AND LOST HIS GUN

Fullerton's Men Make a Big Catch of Hunters at Heron Lake.

Sam Fullerton, state game warden, with Deputies Johnson and Boyd, raided a gang of pot-hunters last week at Heron Lake and made one of the biggest hauls of the season.

Heron Lake is a favorite resort for the canvasbacks who come there to feed on celery. A quartet of Heron Lake men have been monopolizing the lake, driving other sportsmen away by intimidation or annoyance. All are crack shots and had "pump guns," which did awful havoc among the ducks. They shipped many to Chicago and sold others when they could.

Fullerton and his deputies went down last week and Boyd and Johnson, who were unknown to the men, purchased four birds each from Charles Hamilton, Louis Olson, "Doc" Colter and Gus Roux. They then telephoned Fullerton at Jackson. He swore out a warrant Friday and brought a deputy sheriff along. The arrest was made at midnight, and the men taken to Jackson, where they pleaded guilty and were fined. Hamilton, leader of the gang, paid \$85, and the other three \$35 each. Colter refused to pay and went to jail for ninety days.

Fullerton seized four valuable guns, three boats, 480 decoys and forty-four canvasbacks, which will be sold at auction. Hamilton asked Fullerton after the trial:

"Do I get my gun back?"

"No," Fullerton replied.

"Then," said Hamilton, "I will wire for another, and I will shoot the first game warden that comes in sight."

#### HE'S FOR VAN SANT

##### Auditor Dunn Says the Governor is the Logical Candidate.

State Auditor Dunn is back at his desk after a tour of northern Minnesota, conducting sites of state land.

During his absence the editor of the Crookston Times, a democratic organ, boomed him for governor. Mr. Dunn refuses to take the matter seriously. He said this morning:

"That article was written by a personal friend. I am not a candidate for governor, and will not be. I am for Van Sant. He is the logical candidate."

Speaking of the board of control Mr. Dunn said:

The original board of control bill did not include the educational institutions. The legislature amended it and put them in by a decisive vote. We can only act under that bill. The normal schools are under the board of control as far as we are concerned until the supreme court decides otherwise.

The board of control is composed of good men, all of them, and they should be given a chance. They have a difficult task and ought not to be censured until they have time to show what they can do.

As to the university, it never looked horns with the board of control, because it never came near enough.

#### Teacher Sommervold's Case.

John W. Olsen, state superintendent, heard evidence at Bagley Friday in an appeal from the action of County Superintendent Dunwoody. John H. Sommervold, a teacher, was removed by Dunwoody for incompetency. Dunwoody claimed that Sommervold was not capable of teaching the English language. Both were represented by attorneys, who will file briefs within ten days.

#### Ore Rate Case Postponed.

The iron ore-rate case seems doomed to interminable delay. The hearing before the railroad and warehouse commission has been postponed again from Oct. 24 to Nov. 12. This last postponement is on account of the absence of F. B. Kellogg, attorney for the Duluth & Iron Range road.

### ST. PAUL REGRETS IT

#### Residents Hoped Senator Davis' Body Might Remain There.

#### 'T'WILL BE BURIED IN ARLINGTON

Mrs. Davis Removed the Casket Yesterday, Few Knowing of Her Plan.

St. Paul residents and especially the officials about the state capitol, are somewhat disturbed to-day regarding the removal by Mrs. Cushman K. Davis, of her distinguished husband's remains to Washington. Her action is felt as in a sense a wrong to the state of Minnesota.

As one prominent public official put it this morning: "Cushman K. Davis was the greatest son of Minnesota. Here he won his fame and the love of the people, who felt a certain proprietorship on him. It is here that he should rest. It is too late to help it now, and probably it would not have been possible to change Mrs. Davis' mind. She has absolute authority but I feel that she should have had some consideration for others."

The step was taken without knowledge of Senator Davis' former partners, F. B. Kellogg said this morning.

"Both Mr. Severance and I were out of town Saturday. I was much surprised to learn that Mrs. Davis had removed the body of Senator Davis to Washington for interment in Arlington cemetery. I much regret that it has been done. We were informed some time last spring that Mrs. Davis contemplated such a course. We strongly advised her against it and proposed the idea had been abandoned. We were not afterwards consulted about it."

P. J. Henly, who is Senator Davis' private secretary, and is now acting as attorney for Mrs. Davis said:

"Mrs. Davis secured a permit to make the disinterment yesterday afternoon from the department of health, and went to Washington in charge of the casket last night. I have known of her intention for some time, but while I much regret it, it is her right."

The interment at Washington will be in charge of Sergeant-at-Arms Ramsdell, of the United States senate. The remains will be buried in Arlington cemetery, in a plot set aside by the war department, adjoining the graves of distinguished army officers.

Mrs. Davis has no social ties in St. Paul, where she has never been fully admitted by the more exclusive social circles. She prefers living in Washington, where she is treated very differently, and made the removal because she wants to be able to pay frequent visits to the grave. She proposed during the summer to make the interment in Summit avenue, but the city owns no property there, and no steps were taken to acquire any. No effort has been made to comply with her request, and she, therefore, carried out her own wishes, expressed in the letter to Mayor Smith.

#### DETECTIVE MURDERED

##### 'The Goat' Does the Deed While Under Arrest.

Cincinnati, Oct. 21.—Detective Calvin D. Crim was fatally shot to-day by John Foley. Crim was in citizen's clothing, going to a train for a vacation. He encountered Foley on the street, and recognizing him as a recently released convict, who was wanted for picking pockets at funerals, Crim placed him under arrest and started to the station-house. Suddenly Foley drew a revolver and fired a bullet through Crim's body. Two other policemen caught Foley. Foley is also known as Dan Driscoll and as "The Goat." Crim was the leading detective in the famous Pearl Bryan murder case. Last March he served as personal guard for President McKinley at the inauguration.

#### INFATUATED AND TRAGEDY

##### Young Turk Kills a San Francisco Girl and Himself.

San Francisco, Oct. 21.—Mabel Franklin Mayer, aged 13, was murdered early this morning as she slept in her bed at the home of her parents, by John Stano, aged 22 years, who then placed the revolver in his own head and put an end to his life. Stano, who is a native of Smyrna, Turkey, a waiter by occupation, was formerly employed on the United States transport Meade. He was infatuated with the Mayer girl.

#### ALL THE WAY FROM "LUNNON"

Sir Christopher Furness at the Soo on Important Business.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Oct. 21.—Sir Christopher Furness of London, England, is here, accompanied by his private secretary and a party of prominent Montreal men. It is said that Sir Christopher is here for the purpose of looking into the inducements offered by the Soo as the location of a steel ship building plant.

Articles of incorporation have been filed of the Trans-St. Mary's Traction company of Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., capitalized at \$100,000. The stockholders are F. H. Clergue, H. M. Oren and H. Vonachen, the company being the sponsor of the franchise granted E. G. Edruss by the city council in October, 1899. The work of setting poles for the street railway line began to-day and it is supposed to have cars running in the early spring.

#### MURDER AND MYSTERY

##### Probable Work of a Greek Secret Society.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—John Bravish, a Greek, was hurled from a North-Western passenger train between Chicago and Waukegan last night and fatally injured. It is the belief of the police that the "accident" was a deliberately planned murder, done at the bidding of a Greek secret society. Bravish has lived in Waukegan, and yesterday boarded a train for his home with another Greek whose identity has not yet been determined. Their struggle upon the platform was witnessed by no one except a switchman in the railroad yards. He saw Bravish fall under the wheels. Lewis Pappas, another Greek, was arrested on suspicion as he left the train at Waukegan, but he denies all knowledge of the crime.

#### FLY'S EGGS

##### Extraordinary Cause of a Death in Vienna.

Vienna, Oct. 21.—The doctors here were greatly interested in the case of a man 23 years old, who has just died after a six months' painful illness which puzzled the physicians, including German specialists. Shortly before his death his ailment was diagnosed as the result of the hatching of eggs of a blue bottle fly, which the patient had swallowed, the maggots causing perforation of the intestines. The sufferer was then too weak to undergo an operation. An autopsy confirmed the diagnosis. Part of a large intestine was riddled by maggots, they having either eaten through the walls or caused ulceration.

#### HIS CITIZENSHIP A BAR

##### EXPULSION FROM A CHURCH

Reformed Presbyterian Church Has No Use for the United States Constitution.

Boston, Oct. 21.—Because he became a citizen of the United States and swore to uphold the constitution of his adopted country, James Jackson of Cambridge has been suspended from membership in the Second Reformed Presbyterian church of Boston by Rev. J. M. Foster, pastor. The New York presbytery of the church at its fall meeting in Boston last Tuesday confirmed the suspension, refusing to sanction the action of Rev. S. G. Shaw, pastor of the First Reformed Presbyterian church of Cambridge, in admitting Jackson to membership in his congregation after Jackson's suspension.

Jackson is a native of Scotland and came to this country in 1890. He joined Foster's flock and was elected an elder. All elders are obliged to undergo an examination as to fitness for responsibilities conferred. While he was being examined the fact leaked out that Jackson had become a citizen. He explained that his wife had made a visit home in 1890 and he had become a citizen to avoid question as to her right to land here on her return, but that to no purpose. Rev. Mr. Foster said:

It is true that we look upon the constitution of the United States as an immoral document and an insult to the Almighty. We recognize Jesus Christ as the King of all nations and in that sense we do not even mention his name, and makes no reference to him or to the Bible, which is his law. We refuse to accept the constitution thus defective, and cannot swear allegiance to it.

In 1891 the suspension of certain members for swearing to uphold the constitution resulted in the withdrawal of over 2,000 members from the church.

#### SCRAMBLE FOR RED HATS

##### Large Number of Would-Be Cardinals in the United States.

Rome, Oct. 21.—Candidates for the "purple" at the consistory which the pope usually holds about Christmas time are arising everywhere, their numbers seeming to increase in proportion to the distance from Rome. The United States, for instance, besides the candidates of long standing, Archbishop Corrigan and Ireland, who represent two opposite tendencies in the American Roman Catholic church, has on this occasion two additional aspirants for the red hat. There are only four vacancies in the college of cardinals and the American prelates are thought to have few chances of selection, as the pope is credited with a determination not to have more than one cardinal in the United States, fearing that the friction and antagonism would be difficult to harmonize and might be fatal to Catholicism in America.

#### TONKA BAY DECLARES FOR DIVISION.

Excelsior, Minn., Oct. 21.—Freeholders of Tonka Bay voted on Saturday on a proposition to maintain a separate tax and election district for the township of Excelsior. All voice cast were in the affirmative. It was also determined to spend \$300 the coming year for roads and bridges and \$200 for miscellaneous improvements and expenses.

#### MAY VISIT MINNEAPOLIS

##### JAPAN'S GOVERNMENT ARCHITECT

He is on a Tour of This Country and Europe to Get Pointers.

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 21.—S. Yoshii, chief architect to the Japanese government, has arrived from the orient. He was sent abroad by his government to study the public buildings of this country and Europe and will undoubtedly take a look at the Minneapolis courthouse, Guaranty Loan and other buildings. The business blocks here, though simple in architecture, he says, impress him as being characteristic of a modern metropolis in their facilities for the rapid transaction of business.

Mr. Yoshii is one of the most distinguished professional men in the empire. He has been the chief architect for the government for the past fifteen years, and designed and superintended the construction of the present parliament buildings. In addition he has drawn the plans for the railway stations and postoffice and telegraph buildings of Japan. His official titles are: Chief architect to the ministry of communication and chief architect to the home department of Japan. His headquarters is in Tokio.

In addition to public buildings Mr. Yoshii will inspect railway and telegraph stations while on his tour.

Besides the old parliament buildings of Japan, which were destroyed by fire, and the present office, he has designed in recent years the new postoffice at Kioto, a noble structure of granite; the postoffice at Tokio and the central railway station at the same place; and the postoffice at Osaka. These postoffice buildings have just been completed or are nearing completion. They are the first to be constructed under the present movement.


