A PINK MILK SUPPLY

State Inspectors Push Their Crusade Against Tuberculous Cattle.

CONDEMNED COWS NOT DEAD LOSS

In some instances the Meat is Entirely Fit for Human Food.

Of thirty-three tuberculous dairy cows killed during the last three weeks at the Golden Valley abattoir, three were condemned unfit for human consumption. While the disease had made some headway in the other twenty, it was in such a mild form as to have no bad effect upon the beef. It is only when tuberculosis has invaded the lungs and thus infected the entire system, that the beef is "counted out." If the disease reveals itself only in the glands, it is considered simply local, whereupon the meat is approved for food by the inspector.

Twenty-six of the slaughtered cows, whose original misdeeds were to give milk, belonged to Ed Rey, a Golden Valley dairyman, and ten of them were in such bad shape as to be a "dead" loss. The remaining seven, and the property of Emil Rey of St. Louis Park, brother of the other dairyman. Three of this lot were condemned.

Owners Are Recompensed.

Yesterday was the regular weekly "killing" day at the abattoir, and between backs with the cleaver, and an occasional deft touch of the saw on the backbone of the particular subject demanding his attention, the butcher explained that the result had been fairly satisfactory to the unfortunate dairyman.

Said he:

"You see it ain't always a total loss to the milk men. Of course, they stand to lose if the inspector says so. But when he finds that everything's all right about the meat but the glands and gives the beef a free pass, the man who owned the cow gets part of the gain. I mean he's in on a percentage of what the beef will bring at auction. He has to look around for another cow to keep up his supply of milk, but the state gives him an indemnity for her death. It's a funny way to look at it, but after these cows. The lungs may be all shot to pieces, as you can see with the case with this cow—the one that couldn't pass the examination. Now I take a look at her meat. Look's all right, don't it? The fattest, sleekest one in the bunch, she was; just covered with hog fat, but she had it bad.

Then this handsome, stalwart young man, whose face I might call intelligent, face lit accorded with his gory calling, went into an extended dissertation on fresh beef from the lay standpoint. At the time he was obligingly laid bare the glands on the beef, which qualified, exposing to view the lumpy, grape-like growths which are considered too remote from the rest of the bovine system to have had any contaminating effect upon it.

The cows dispatched yesterday were killed under the watchful eye of State Sanitary Inspector Poppin, who duly tagged each carcass after it had been drawn and drawn and sent to permit of no mistake as to its identity.

WILL APPEAL BORAX CASES

Rumberg and Wagonholes Convicted of Using Preservatives.

J. M. Rumberg and C. F. Wagonholes, butchers, accused of violating the state dairy and food laws by using sulphurous acid and borax in preserving meats for the trade, were found guilty in municipal court yesterday afternoon. The defense tried to convince the court as to the unconstitutionality of the act of the 1901 legislature, which prohibits the use of these preservatives, but without avail. It was shown in the trial that borax and sulphurous acid, while being effective preservatives, destroyed the "bright" taste and color of meats unfit for consumption, and made it practically impossible for consumers to detect tainted goods.

It is probable that an appeal will be taken to the supreme court. About twenty similar cases are pending against butchers, grocers and other dealers, and these have been continued until early in January. It is believed that a ruling of the supreme court will be received by that time, and the parties have agreed to abide by the decisions in the test cases of Rumberg and Wagonholes.

ENTERTAINED AT ST. PAUL

Clapp at their head, escorted him to the other town yesterday, and gave him a nice quiet time. He was first taken by special trolley to Como park, where the park superintendent gave him a whirl on an automobile. Then the party visited the Indian Mounds and Fort Snelling. On the trip back to St. Paul, the party called at the Elks of Ramsey and Seventh streets, and traversed Summit avenue and St. Anthony hill, returning finally to the Ryan hotel.

Pickett was the guest of honor at dinner at the Ryan, and in the evening he presided over the Elks' meeting. Mr. Pickett spoke of "The Good of the Order," John J. H. McElroy, ex-Governor of A. H. Hall of Minneapolis; Senator Clapp, Governor Van Sant, H. P. Hall, Conde Hamlin, R. J. Woods of Sioux Falls; Fred S. Robinson of Dubuque, and C. S. Kingsley of Waterloo, made brief addresses.

CIVIL SERVICE CHANCES

Four Series of Examinations Soon to Take Place.

The civil service commission announces examinations Nov. 12 for the position of copper plate engraver. The salary is from \$3 to \$4 per day.

Nov. 19 examinations will be held of applicants applying for the position of inspector in the immigration service, acting as interpreter of Finnish and Scandinavian languages. The salary is \$6 per day, not exceeding eight days a month.

Nov. 22-27 applicants for place as junior architectural draughtsman will be examined. The positions are in the office of the supervising architect; one pays \$1,000 and three \$340 per year.

Applicants for position of fireman in the quartermasters' department at large will be examined Dec. 12. Two men are wanted on the Weitzel at Fort Preble, Me., and one on the Reynolds at Fort Dade, Fla.

PAYING LICENSE FEES

Private Elevator Men Are Not Disposed to Fight.

Over a hundred so-called "private" elevators have paid a license fee and put themselves under the authority of the railroad and warehouse commission. They are elevators not on railroad land, but on spur tracks or sidings, and according to a recent opinion of Attorney General they are subject to state regulation.

A legal battle was looked for, but has not materialized. Not a single owner has made a disposition to contest the matter. Henry Feig, supervising inspector of elevators, says that there are without doubt many more elevators which should take out licenses, and they will be looked up as rapidly as possible.

The license fee is only \$1. What the elevator owners dislike about being licensed is the necessity of making reports to the railroad and warehouse commission.

A NEW CEMETERY

'Twill Be Established on Slightly Ground Near Hopkins.

A cemetery is to be established at Hopkins on the domain of Johnston Mealy, which is one of the most picturesque tracts of land in the county. It lies opposite the country poor farm and one of the knolls is probably the highest point of land in Hennepin county. Mr. Mealy has decided the land to the Grand View Park Cemetery association in consideration of \$25,000.
