

CANADIAN ACCUSES 'BOES' IN BEERTOWN

Says Uncle Sam Is Dominating the Whole Continent.

ISTHMIAN CANAL IS DISCUSSED

Canadian Minister of Justice Is Apparently in a Frame of Mind.

London, Oct. 30.—David Mills, Minister of Justice for Canada, has an important article in the November number of the Empire Review. In it the Monroe doctrine and the interoceanic canal conditions under which the Monroe doctrine was proclaimed, and the Clayton-Bulwer treaty negotiated are described in detail and the conclusions are drawn that the United States government is assuming sovereignty over both North and South America; that it is striving to restrict the commerce of other states for its own advantage; that Canada will never be content to submit to any other rule than that of perfect equality respecting the canal, and that her interests must not be sacrificed by the United Kingdom for any consideration. Mr. Mills contends that the neutrality of the canal must be guaranteed as provided for by the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and that the United Kingdom must not yield to the demands of what he describes as an ambitious and not over-scrupulous state to erect fortifications upon the borders of a waterway and to take possession of it.

DEFENSES FOR HARBORS

TWENTY-FIVE ARE PROVIDED FOR

Chief of Engineers Mentions More Works Needed and Appropriations Wanted.

Washington, Oct. 30.—Twenty-five of the principal harbors of the United States now have a sufficient number of heavy guns and mortars mounted to permit of effective defense against naval attack, says General Gillespie, chief of engineers, in his annual report. He briefly describes the original project framed by the Endicott board for coast defense and shows how it has been amended from year to year. The important changes were the provision for rapid-fire guns, a reduction in the number and calibre of heavy guns and the elimination of armed batteries. Provision has been made for equipping 325 heavy guns, 327 rapid-fire guns and 375 mortars. Now General Gillespie wants sites for more new batteries and for gun and mortar batteries asks an appropriation of \$4,000,000.

CHEERED CZOLGOSZ

London Anarchists at Night Celebrate the Execution.

London, Oct. 30.—The anarchistic clubs of London celebrated the execution of Czolgosz by dances in honor of "his loyal death." Various groups met at their respective headquarters late last night and most of the gatherings only dispersed at 4 o'clock this morning, after singing the "Carmagnole." All the meetings lustily cheered every mention of Czolgosz, whose portrait, draped with black and red, occupied the place of honor on the platforms. There were remarkable scenes on the dispersal of the clubs, groups of anarchists shouting "Vive la republique!" singing "Carmagnole," dancing and shouting "Czolgosz, the brave." The police dispersed some of the groups. The increasing activity of the anarchists is occasioning concern to Scotland yards.

ROYAL WOMAN SPECULATOR

Princess Waldemar Interested in Danish Commercial Development.

Copenhagen, Oct. 30.—That energetic business woman and money-maker, the Princess Waldemar of Denmark, formerly Princess Marie of Orleans, eldest daughter of the Duke of Chartres, is enlarging her sphere of interest. She is now starting in business as a real estate speculator, having secured a plot of ground adjoining Copenhagen and obtained the municipal sanction to divide it into lots on which she proposes to erect villas to rent to aristocratic people. The princess is also interesting herself in a plan for the benefit of Danish West India, and for the development of Danish commerce in Asia. She has received valuable concessions from Russia in connection with the Asiatic trade.

No More Snaps for the "Wearies" in Wisconsin's Metropolis.

POLICE HAVE THEIR ORDERS

Free Lodging and Hot Coffee Things of the Past in Chicago and Elsewhere.

Special to The Journal. Milwaukee, Oct. 30.—No more nice warm cells with a cup of coffee in the morning for the "Weary Willies." The police of Milwaukee have been instructed to wage a relentless war on the hobo who has been accustomed each recurring winter to come here and get lodgings in the police stations. Chief Jensen has heard from Chicago, in that city the transient hobo there not only had accommodations in the police station, but the city hall itself has frequently been turned into a lodging house. Mayor Harrison has ordered the free lodgings and hot coffee game to be stopped. The hobo knows it. By his peculiar method of wireless telegrams he knows it from Ohio to Omaha. He is skipping Chicago and coming to Milwaukee. That is what Jensen fears, and why he will take stern measures to dissuade "Willie" from visiting here.

"Ninety days" is what Judge Neelen says when the hoboes are brought in before him with a statement like the following from the station keeper at Central police headquarters: "Your honor, this man has come in for lodgings for the last three nights. He's a hobo."

HIS NAME WRITTEN THERE

HUFSCHMIDT GETS ON THE BALLOT

Republican Success Endangered by Opposition to Him, Persecution Being Charged.

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 30.—The state election board has decided the case of Robert Hufschmidt, the democratic nominee for representative in Allamakee county. Colonel A. G. Stewart, the republican county chairman, objected to Hufschmidt's name going on the ballot for the reason that the county convention was not held until Oct. 5, the last day for filing under the law, and it was a physical impossibility to get the certificate to Des Moines and file it legally before midnight.

It developed that the certificate of nomination had been filled out in blank and sent to the democratic state headquarters Oct. 3 and then filled out and filed on receipt of a telegram Oct. 5, after the convention, to the effect Hufschmidt was nominated. The election board held the original certificate of nomination invalid, but in its decision to-day it permitted Hufschmidt's name to go on the ballot on the strength of a certificate of nomination to fill a vacancy from the county central committee of Allamakee county, which was authorized to fill any vacancy on the ticket.

Governor Shaw Criticized for His Speech at Fondra.

In the course of his address, the governor referred to Mr. Cummins as a "brilliant candidate," and otherwise lauded him and gave Allison high tribute in a sketch of his congressional career. He dismissed Dolliver with a bare mention, though the latter is his own appointee to the senatorship.

A RATHER MELANCHOLY CLOSE AT BUFFALO

Correspondence of the Journal. Buffalo, Oct. 22.—The warning days of the exposition are being marked, as with mile-stones, by the filing of legal claims against the exposition company. The deficit financially is now estimated at over \$4,000,000, \$500,000 of which will be defaulted on first mortgage bonds, the same amount on second mortgage bonds, over \$2,000,000 on common stock and fully another million of outstanding indebtedness. Those holding exposition paper are somewhat worried as to their liability for the defaulted debts of the company, and there is talk of a lun being laid on the land on which the buildings stand as well as on the buildings themselves by the contractors who built them and have to date only received a payment of a little over 30 per cent. Suits aggregating several thousand dollars have been brought by some of the midway concessionaires against the exposition company for breach of contract, and altogether things look hot for the management. The clearing of the grounds will probably be let to the Chicago Wrecking company, a concern which sprang into prominence at the time of the clearing of the world's fair grounds. Minnesota will try to sell her building, and, in fact, a number of people have looked over the building with a view of purchasing. All the exhibits which have a future value will be packed up and returned to the state and the furniture will be taken back by the New England Furniture & Carpet company of Minneapolis, from which concern it was leased. \$5,000 FOR THE RELIEF OF AMES.

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 30.—The executive council has appropriated upwards of \$5,000, the balance remaining in the presidential contingent fund placed by the legislature at its disposal, for the relief of the Iowa Agricultural college in the recent loss of the experimental station barn. The barn was erected by Secretary of Agriculture Wilson in 1894. It was destroyed by fire recently with a loss of \$25,000. The appropriation made to-day will be used to buy feed, a large amount of which was burned, and to erect a temporary structure.
