UNCLE SAM'S TREASURE

FISCAL OPERATIONS OF A YEAR

Surplus Slightly Less—A Healthful Growth of Gold in the Treasury.

Washington, Nov. 1.—Ellis H. Roberts, treasurer of the United States, in his report of the transactions of his office during the last fiscal year, says that the treasury was never stronger than at the close of that period. The operations, which were of the first order, resulted in noteworthy changes in the paper currency, as well as a steady and healthful growth of gold in the treasury and in the general stock.

The net ordinary revenues for the past year were \$587,685,337, an increase of \$29,444,486 over those of 1900, which were the next highest recorded. The increase came from each of the heads of resources, but chiefly from internal revenue.

On the side of the expenditures, the total of \$509,967,353 has been exceeded only four times, in 1863, 1864, 1865 and 1899. The surplus of \$77,717,984 was slightly under \$2,000,000 less than in 1900. Inclusive of the transactions affecting the public debt the aggregate receipts were \$1,146,489,306, and the aggregate disbursements \$1,077,661,322.

The monetary stock of the country received during the year an increase of

upwards of \$88,000,000 in gold, \$37,000,000 in silver coins, and nearly \$16,000,000 in notes and certificates. The circulation per capita was \$26.50 July 1, 1900; \$28 July 1, 1901, and \$28.52 Oct. 1, 1901.

Up to the last date, from July 1, 1897, there was an increase of \$463,130,458 in the stock of gold, which was then estimated at \$1,160,353,790, and of this there was \$908,718,436 in circulation in the form of coin or certificates.

By Oct. 31, the gold in the treasury, consisting of the reserve, the security for certificates and the sum in the general fund was \$542,822,849, the highest in the history of the country and more than was ever held under single control elsewhere in the world, except once for a few months.

Arrangements are completed, subject to action by congress, for putting out notes and certificates with the beginning of the calendar year 1902, at the rate of 135,000,000 pieces annually. It is hoped that this the currency will be well seasoned before it is issued.

The redemption of national bank notes were the heaviest in twenty-two years, amounting to \$147,486,577, an increase of \$50,503,970 over 1900.

Lowell, Mass.—A seismic disturbance of several seconds' duration was felt in about the higher elevations of the city last night.

Bozeman—Mrs. Lucy Black, charged with having poisoned her husband, has been bound over without bail on the charge of murder.

Dallas, Texas—The suits filed by Attorney General Bell against the corporations accused of violating the Texas anti-trust law call for penalties approximating \$5,000,000.

St. Louis—Four deaths have been reported from the use of antitoxin furnished by the city in the treatment of diphtheria and two patients are dying while eight others are seriously affected.

New York—Johann Most, the anarchist recently sent to the penitentiary for the publication in his paper of an article entitled "Murder Versus Murderer," has been released in bonds of \$1,500, on a certificate of reasonable doubt.

Cheyenne, Wyo.—Bankers and other wealthy men of Holland are making arrangements for establishing a colony of Boers and Hollanders in Wyoming. A tract of 300,000 acres has been secured in the valley of the Green river in Sweetwater county.

Washington—Jaffet, "The Red," a noted Italian anarchist, is thought to be about leaving Antwerp for the United States. Commissioner Powderly has given directions that all incoming passengers should be watched to see that he does not land.

Charleston, S. C.—Because he openly boasted of having fired the first shot at a negro who had been strung to a tree by a mob of lynchers, the citizens of Columbia have prepared a petition urging President Roosevelt not to commission George H. Keaster, recently appointed collector of internal revenue from this state.

Chicago—Judge Elbridge Haney of the circuit court has issued an order summoning before him Monday morning the owner of the Chicago American, William R. Hearst, and six employees to show cause why they should not be punished for contempt of court.

Madrid—General Arenoso Linares, the objectionable publications were news items, editorials and cartoons reflecting on the motives of the judge in a recent decision in which the People's Gaslight and Coke company of this city was interested.

Glasgow—The bubonic plague has reappeared here. Four suspected cases were removed from the Central station hotel, belonging to the Caledonian railway, and one man is dead.

Havana—General Bartolomeo Maso has surprised Senor Tomas Estrada Palma and the latter's supporters by coming out with a manifesto, declaring himself a candidate for the presidency of Cuba. He makes a strong bid for the negro and Spanish vote.

Catalagon, Samir, P. Twelve men of Company G of the Ninth infantry, under command of Sergeant Wilford, were attacked by 140 insurgents, who killed two of the soldiers and wounded two others. Wilford remained cool and collected during the attack, and fourteen insurgents were killed.

Madrid—General Arenoso Linares, who commanded the Spanish forces at Santiago when the city was attacked by the Americans during the Spanish-American war, and who was

severely wounded in the battle, has been granted a pension and the cross of San Fernando, because of his defense of Santiago.

Lisbon—Visconde Santos-Thyryo, Portuguese minister to Washington, has been recalled in consequence of his premature announcement of McKinley's death, which caused the government great annoyance. His successor will probably be Martens Ferrao, former Portuguese secretary to the vatican.

WISCONSIN

EAU CLAIRE—Arne Hagegnes was brought before Judge Gilbertson on complaint of W. A. Rouse, charging larceny. He pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned.

MEDFORD—A severe wind visited this section. Buildings were unroofed and windows broken. The barn of Albert Zimmerman was blown down and three horses killed.

LAW CROSSE—J. Murphy, a business man of Wesley, Iowa, was in the city searching for his young daughter, whom he says was lured away from her home by a patent medicine man whose name he does not know.

WEST SUPERIOR—Captain Newton was last night presented with a handsome sword by the citizens of Superior, at the banquet given in his honor at the West Superior Hotel. State Senator E. G. Mills made the presentation.

OSHKOSH—The disappearance of a Kenosha young woman was cleared up in this city when the police took into custody Carl Schwartz and Irma Becker. They were living at the Columbia Hotel as man and wife, having registered as Mr. and Mrs. Carl Mayer.

FRONTENAC—The October musicale was given at Villa Maria and the program was enjoyed by large numbers. Little Evelyn Meyer of Minneapolis has the honor of holding the scholarship established by the Villa Maria alumnae association.

DULUTH—P. H. Stevens, a workman, fell off the rear porch of a saloon and broke his back—A Duluth mining man is authority for the statement that the proposed \$2,000,000 steel corporation, of which H. W. Frick is to be the head, is expecting to obtain much of its ore supplies from lands controlled by J. J. Hill.

ST. CLOUD—City Attorney J. R. Bennett has demurred to the complaint made by the Industrial Trust company of Providence, R. I., against the city of St. Cloud. The demurrer is made on the grounds that the federal court is not the proper place to bring the action. It is further contended that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action.

SOUTH DAKOTA

WEBSTER—A prairie fire swept over the region adjacent to Roblyn postoffice and destroyed in the neighborhood of 150 tons of hay.

SIOUX FALLS—Jacob Heiser, city marshal of Colman, has taken back to that place 970 men who were arrested here. It is said they were members of a thieving crew and robbed one of their number of \$20.
