### NOT CAUGHT BY WINTER

GRAFTON COUNTRY READY FOR IT

Grain Generally Secured and Fall Plowing Done—What is Doing in Land.

Grafton, N. D., Nov. 4.—The first cold wave of the season is felt here. The ground is frozen to the depth of nearly an inch. The thrashing in the three counties of Walsh, Pembina and Cavalier is practically completed and the results are most satisfactory. While the wheat yield has been somewhat disappointing, the yield of flax, barley and oats have far overbalanced the wheat shortage. Everywhere the flax yields have been from 25

to 50 per cent heavier than expected, and barley has frequently yielded forty bushels to the acre, and the price has varied from 40 to 45 cents. The result is that barley has been the best-paying crop this year.

A much greater amount of plowing has been done this fall than usual. On the whole, this section of the state was never in better shape financially and otherwise. The movement in land in this section of the state has been unprecedented. While in this country there has been nothing phenomenal, yet in Cavalier and Pembina counties the sales have been enormous. The recent school land sale in Cavalier county realized the enormous sum of \$185,058.10, one quarter selling for over \$30 an acre. This total amount is nearly half as much as was received from the entire sales in the six valley counties. Bowesmont, in Pembina county, has been the scene of great activity of late. This is what is called the "alkali section," and land there two years ago could be bought from \$2 to \$4 an acre. To-day there are at least six different land companies operating, and quarter sections are selling from \$2,000 to \$2,400 to actual settlers. The banner sale in Pembina county was a half section a mile west of St. Thomas, for \$12,000. This is a record-maker. It is everywhere evident that people are pinning their faith to Red River dirt.

What is true of the lands here is true across the border in the Canadian northwest. William Ritchie of this city, who is a land agent for the Canadian Pacific railway, recently sold in one week 168,000 acres.

### VENOM FROM TILLMAN

HE DENOUNCES THE PRESIDENT

Pitchfork Wielder Says No Southern Gentleman Will Eat With Mr. Roosevelt.

St. Louis, Nov. 4.—"No self-respecting man can sit at a table with a negro," President Roosevelt will find out when he comes south. No southern gentleman will sit at dinner with him.

Senator Benjamin R. Tillman of South Carolina, speaking of the Booker T. Washington dinner, made the foregoing declaration last night in the union station while waiting a train. He added: "Social equality between the two races is impossible. Why, our very civilization in the south depends upon keeping our prestige over the negroes. To allow them equal social privileges with the whites would be ruinous. No man can know this truly until he has lived in the south. Then he knows it so well that he can't tell it without 'cussing.' Imagine the two races bundled together into a kind of a pie—black and white pie, a kind of mongrel pie. We don't want any of that kind of pie down south. We know the negro question so well that we class a man who eats with negroes in the same class with the negroes. President Roosevelt will find this out."

### IOWA'S BOY MURDERER

Another Movement Started for a Pardon for Elkins.

Charles City, Iowa, Nov. 4.—The Iowa legislature will be asked this winter to pardon Wesley Elkins, the murderer, sent up for life from Clayton, county twelve years ago. The application will be filed with the governor in a few days. Professor James E. Harlan of Cornell, who championed the boy's cause when it was before the general assembly four years ago, will have charge of the case again.

Wesley Elkins is the youngest prisoner ever sent up for the crime for murder in Iowa. He was 12 years old when he was sentenced for killing his father and step-mother. He had been punished in a sensational manner in the past, and the baby in his arms and went to the neighbors and told the remarkable story for one of his years that tramps had attacked his parents and that he took the baby and started to give the alarm.

### NEW INSULAR CASE

It May Cause a Delay in Pending Supreme Court Decisions.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Cases have reached the supreme court of the United States which, in the opinion of officials of the department of justice, will cause the court to withhold its decisions in the pending insular cases for weeks or months. The suits are known as the Alaska license cases. The first is the action of a man of the name of Corbus against the Alaska Treadwell Mining company. Corbus is a stockholder in that corporation, and he sues to recover the license fee paid by the company for the privilege of doing business in the territory. The question involved is whether congress has the authority to pass a taxing law applicable to a particular territory as it has done to Alaska. The cases attracted no attention until a hint was sent to the department of justice that the question had a bearing on the issue in the second Dooly case, which involves the right of congress to levy duties on goods going from New York into Porto Rico.

### NINETY-SIX CARS OF FLOUR

Washburn-Crosby Company's Loss by Fire at Manitowoc.

Manitowoc, Wis., Nov. 4.—Seventy-three cars loads of flour on track and twenty-three car loads in the warehouse of the Washburn-Crosby Milling company were destroyed by fire last night, together with the warehouse and dock property of the road.

The loss will reach \$125,000, fully covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

It was the fiercest fire in the history of the city while it lasted, and only the combined efforts of the entire fire department prevented the further spread of the flames.

The flour was the property of the Washburn-Crosby Milling company of Minneapolis. The warehouse and dock were built a few years ago at a cost of \$45,000.

The wound resulted in death an hour later.
