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PICKETT IN COURT

He Hears the Indictment Charging Him With Murder.

PLEA OF "NOT GUILTY" ENTERED

And the Case is Set for Trial Nov. 29—An Unusual Form of Indictment.

Ruben C. Pickett was arraigned on the charge of murder in the first degree yesterday and faced his trying situation with apparent composure.

The indictment charging Pickett with the murder of his first wife, Mrs. Mary Neison, was read to him by the attorney, H. B. Chamberlain.

It was understood that the right to demur to the indictment remains open for a week.

The case was set for trial on Nov. 29, but it is hardly likely that it will be reached by that time as there are many cases which have precedence.

The indictment charges that Pickett killed his wife "in some way" to the jury unknown.

The witnesses examined by the grand jury in this matter were Mary Neison, Mary Michaud, Lizzy Flare, Maud E. Howard and Dr. Henry S. Nelson, who was coroner at the time the alleged crime was committed.

Thomas Leonard, who broke out of the workhouse on July 22 shortly after Superintendent McDonald took charge of the institution, was arraigned. He surprised all by pleading not guilty.

Charles Jones and James Ryan, the bold hoboes who tried the hold-up game across the street from the city hall and were almost smothered by a rush of detectives, declined to admit their guilt.
