CASE IS STILL OPEN

"Big Nine" Conference Doesn't Settle Mueller's Standing.

WILLIAMS PERMANENTLY OUT

The Conference Thought the Interests of Athletics Prevented Reinstatement.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—The "Big Nine" conference in session at Chicago yesterday voted not to reinstate Clyde Williams, captain and quarterback of the University of Iowa football team.

The conference, by a vote of 8 to 1, declared that the assumed name rule applied to vacation sports as well as to those of the college year, and to both collegiate and non-collegiate sports.

Mr. Williams' claims to reinstatement were considered at great length and were supported by numerous affidavits.

Mr. Williams appeared and made a statement of his case, creating a most favorable impression. The opinion seemed to be that Mr. Williams had been made the tool of others.

The conference was asked informally whether it would make in such a case as that of George Mueller. The general opinion was that the character of the sports at La Crosse, in which Mueller participated, was not professional, but that the sports partook more of the nature of pure amusements.

Only three of those present said that Mueller should be barred. The final action was taken on the case, however, the fact being that Mueller's case was held up and may be acted upon later.

CALL IT JUST

Iowa Students on the Verdict as to Williams.

Special to The Journal. Iowa City, Iowa, Nov. 7.—The news that Captain Williams had been refused reinstatement by the conference was known to practically every student of the University of Iowa within an hour of its receipt here.

The interest in the decision was intense all day and crowds hung about Clinton street in front of the bulletin board waiting for the news. It was received with expressions of sorrow for Captain Williams that his athletic career should be cut short, but with acknowledgment of the justice of the verdict.

The practice at Iowa field last night showed the most perfect team work that has been exhibited by the varsity. Jones made one touchdown by running down a kickoff and later made another while playing left halfback while Dwight Griffith played at quarter. Howell, the new sub for left half was out for practice and did well in carrying the ball and helping the runner. Macy repeatedly earned Coach Knipe's commendation.

"Go it, Macy, that's great football," said Knipe at one time as Macy was pulling Siberts through the line. Two other points were scored in all by the varsity against the scrubs in a short twenty-minute line-up.

Emmett Burrier of Farmington, right tackle on the varsity, will be the captain of the team for the rest of the games. This is his fourth year on the varsity and also his fourth year at tackle.

MORE PROTESTS
