LESS WORKING HOURS Strike Brewing Among Fox River Paper Mill Hands. Appleton, Wis., Nov. 15.—Between 5,000 and 6,000 employees of fifty or sixty paper mills located in Fox and Wisconsin rivers valleys, represented by the Fox River Paper Mill Employees' union, yesterday united in a demand upon the manufacturers to close the mills from Saturday evening to Monday morning, instead of as at present from Sunday morning to Monday morning. This means a reduction of working hours 10 per cent, without a reduction of pay.

VERDICT TOO LOW New York Justice Gives a Jury a Severe Scolding. New York, Nov. 15.—Justice O'Grann in the supreme court to-day, in a long motion, set aside a verdict for \$300 in favor of Julius Wiltsen, who sued the Metropolitan Street Railway company for \$15,000 for the death of his 12-year-old son, Lawrence, on the ground that such a verdict was utterly inadequate. The action taken by Justice O'Grann is said to be without precedent in New York courts. In setting aside the verdict the justice said: "Manufacturers are given till Dec. 1 to answer demands. They are reticent as to what answer will be given."
