

BURNING IN MID-AIR IN SIGHT OF HUNDREDS MAN AND WOMAN ON LIVE WIRE

Ida Jantz, Looking at a Fire From a Roof, Falls Off and Hangs, Screaming in Agony, Across an Electric Wire— Thomas H. Bell, After Releasing Her, Loses His Balance and Falls Upon the Same Wire—The Woman Dies; He Is Saved.

Cleveland, Nov. 14.—A woman hanging in mid-air, screaming in agony, held the gaze of hundreds of horror-stricken people who had gathered near the Wright House on Ontario Street.

Attracted by a slight fire in that vicinity, a number of employes and others got on the roof of the building to see the cause. Ida Jantz was one of the number, and, while looking over the coping, unthinkingly took hold of a live electric wire.

The shock from the heavily charged wire threw her writhing, over the edge of the roof upon the wire and she hung there while the crowd below looked on, powerless to help.

School Director Thomas H. Bell, was near and saw the woman's terrible predicament. The only way he could reach her was by a window overlooking Ontario

Street, and to this he rushed. He climbed up and up to a fire escape till he was opposite the woman, who by this time was unable longer to cry out.

On a level with the roof, Mr. Bell reached out and, with great effort raised her from the wire until she was within reach of those above who lifted her senseless form over the coping.

But, when the strain was over, Bell's foot slipped. To save himself from a frightful fall to the pavement he grasped wildly and fell across the same wire from which he had just rescued the woman.

The shock rendered him powerless to move and he hung there helpless while the silent, deadly current burned into his flesh. No one was brave enough to attempt his rescue and it was several minutes before the current was turned off, and he was removed to a place of safety.

The woman died, but Mr. Bell was taken to the General Hospital, where the doctors found him suffering from a very severe nervous shock in addition to being frightfully burned. A few days later he was removed to his home, where he was confined for eleven months. During the first three months of his illness it was found necessary to resort to skin grafting in order to heal his wounds.

I think from what I hear we are going into dry dock, as the ship needs repairs very badly. Her propeller shaft is loose and jumps back and forth in a heavy sea."

We left Newport Thursday evening, Aug. 22, and arrived at Ponta Delgada, Sunday, Sept. 15. We went ashore there on Wednesday and had a glorious time. Imagine how we felt to step on land after seeing nothing but water for almost a month.

We were given two dollars in "spickety" coin in Portugal money to spend. The first thing I did was to get a good "feed." We came to this place last Monday with the greatest possible speed. A strong wind favored us, and we had the engines working for all they were worth. Then the wind shifted and we had to take in all the sail except the foremast and the fore and aft sails. Not long before we reached the port a storm that scared everybody aboard. You cannot imagine how quickly the wind came up and how hard it blew. We took in all the light sails and reefed the topsails and foremast as quickly as possible. The wind was so strong that it was all I could do to cling to the yard. The ship pitched and rocked until I thought it would fall apart. It was impossible to sleep on deck that night.

I like port in some ways a great deal better than being at sea. We get better grub and more sleep in port. At sea one watches the dog watches from 4 to 6 and from 6 to 8 p. m.

About the first thing we heard in Ponta Delgada was the news of President McKinley's assassination, but we heard nothing definite about it. It made us all very sad. In trying to run out of Gibraltar Oct. 16 the ship was caught in a fierce storm. The wind was so strong that it was all I could do to keep my feet on the deck. The ship pitched and rocked until I thought it would fall apart. It was impossible to sleep on deck that night.
