Iowa-Cleveland Marriage to Combine Them.

DR. KINCAID AND MRS. BISSELL

Widow Will Establish Institutions for Reform Sinners and Cure Consumptives.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 20.—The announcement was made by a dispatch from Mrs. Clara Alice Bissell, the wealthy Cleveland widow whose interest in the murderer, Nicholas Heenev, attracted so much attention some months ago, would be married Thanksgiving day to Dr. D. L. Kincaid, dean of the Ottumwa (Iowa) college, a clergyman of oecumenical fame, whose son is president. Mrs. Bissell was seen at her apartments in the Belgrade, and said that the announcement was correct, and that the wedding would occur at her home. She said that Dr. Kincaid would arrive in Cleveland the Monday before the wedding and that they would remain in this city for some time afterward, later going to Iowa.

During the trial of Nicholas Heenev for beating a railroad gatekeeper's brains out with a coupling pin, for which Heenev is serving a life sentence at Columbus, Mrs. Bissell's attempt to defend him and her intense interest, said to have resulted in Heenev's conversion, attracted a great deal of attention, as did also her announced project of establishing an institution for the reform of young men as Heenev. Mrs. Bissell said to a reporter last night: "The St. Paul, and in fact, all the Minnesota newspapers printed a great deal about my work in the Heenev case, and Dr. Kincaid wrote to me, he having been in St. Paul at the time and becoming interested in my work. In his letters he said that he admired my work and asked me what I thought of the project of establishing an institution for the cure of poor people suffering from diseases. I answered that I was going to establish an institution for the cure of prisoners suffering from consumption, the disease that rages so terribly in the jails and prisons. Dr. Kincaid came here to Cleveland to see me about six months ago, and he grew to think a great deal of me.

He became very much interested in my plan to establish a sanatorium for the cure of prisoners suffering from the death disease. He said that he would do anything for me. We became engaged, and the wedding is to occur Thanksgiving day. Dr. Kincaid is one of the most distinguished physicians in the west and has a high standing as a doctor wherever he is known. He was in Cleveland for about a week and would have remained here longer, but he had to return to his doctor to get a prisoner pardoned, and he went back west. He has promised to start a sanatorium for me and that he would treat all the consumptive prisoners I could get. He has been practicing medicine for twenty-two years and is about 55 years old. The homes about which so much has been said will be established, probably the first one at Columbus, and later there will be a chain of them all over the country. Dr. Kincaid says that I have the idea that he is going to be the great thing of the century, and he wants to help me with the work. The institutions will be called "The Homes of the Army of the Prince of Peace." The benefits of the institutions will not be limited to prisoners, but will be open to all poor people.

It is said that as soon as a minor heir is of age, Mrs. Bissell will inherit half of an immense estate. She lives in a handsome suite of apartments in the Belgrade. Last evening the rooms were littered with delicate finery such as might form part of the dowry of a princess from Minneapolis announcing the coming marriage of Mrs. Bissell as a millionaire's. She is the widow of Dr. A. G. Bissell, who died of being shot in the years. The prospective bridegroom has been a widower twenty years.

\$50,000 FOR ST. LOUIS

MONTANA PLANS TO SPEND IT

Most of This Will Be Raised by Subscription—Clark Will Give \$10,000.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 20.—The honorary commission of the Louisiana purchase exposition which was appointed by Governor Toole to devise a means for raising funds for a Montana exhibit at the St. Louis fair, will hold its first meeting this week. The commission was the result of the failure of the last legislature to make an appropriation for the fair. As the next legislature does not meet until 1902, it became necessary to resort to this method of raising funds.

The commission is composed of well-known citizens, who are expected to take an active interest in the project. It is likely that they will draft an appeal to the liberally disposed people of Montana to subscribe towards the fund. A large sum can be raised in that manner if citizens respond as liberally as expected. Senator W. A. Clark has promised to head the list with \$10,000. If not enough is raised by subscription, resort will be had to selling state medals or souvenirs to make up the remainder. The state will spend about \$50,000 on its exhibit if present plans are followed.

OFFICIALS NOT ALARMED

See No Cause for Uneasiness in Exports of Gold.

Washington, Nov. 20.—Treasury officials feel no apprehension on account of exportations of gold. Secretary Gage today said that he would not make, at this time, any statement in regard to the matter, but it is known that he regards the shipments as a natural movement in view of the quite general demand for money in Europe and that he believes there is nothing in the situation to cause the least uneasiness.

On the contrary, treasury officials say that the business affairs of Europe within the last few years have become so intimately connected with our own that a monetary stringency or disturbance of any character there would be deplored and, if possible, relieved for the common good.

WILL REFORM PROCEDURE

British Government Anxious to Overcome Obstruction.

London, Nov. 20.—It is understood that the British government intends to propose a reform of the procedure of parliament to overcome obstruction.

The scheme will suggest that the house assemble at 2:30 p. m., instead of 4, that government business be taken first, that an adjournment from 7:30 until 9 be taken for dinner, that questions then be taken up, and ordinary business be carried on until midnight.

Under the new scheme, disorderly members would be more sternly punished for the first offense and suspended for a month, with increasing punishments for renewed offenses, and offenders would be compelled to apologize before being permitted to return to parliament.



NATIONAL STOCKMEN

They Want an Annual Census and Another Secretary.

Special to The Journal. Pierre, S. D., Nov. 20.—The National Live Stock association, to which Governor Herreid has just appointed Alfred Newton, J. Q. Anderson and Eugene Holcomb as delegates, is one of growing interest to the range country of the northwest. Among the questions discussed will be

a demand for second assistant secretary of agriculture to look after live stock interests alone; provision for an annual classified census of live stock, the figures to be published within ninety days from the time the census is taken; and measures for classified assessment of live stock.

At the last meeting of the board of county commissioners of Hughes county, a resolution was passed, providing for the refunding of \$60,000 of county bonds, reducing the interest from 7 per cent to 4.
