

Tawney Will Introduce It and Put It Through. AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE PLACES One of the Vacancies May Be Filled by Mr. McCleary of Minnesota.

Washington, Nov. 21.—It is the judgment of members of both houses of congress now in the city that congress will pass the Grouse bill during the coming session. The bill will probably be introduced by Congressman Tawney of Minnesota, who has from the first been an ardent supporter of the idea.

It is not generally known that there will be five republican vacancies on the house committee on agriculture this session, that number of republicans having failed to be returned. There will be a lively scramble among the members from the various states of the middle west for one or more of these places.

TO LIBERATE A MURDERESS. She Has Served Twenty-nine Years for Killing an Old Man.

Paterson, N. J., Nov. 21.—Members of the W. C. T. U. are at the head of a movement to secure the pardon of Libbie Garrison, who has been in state prison at Trenton for the murder of Ransom F. Burrows, an old man with whom she lived. During the last fifteen years repeated efforts have been made to have her pardoned.

RUSSIAN EXCLUSIVENESS. Illegal Order to Kill Importation of Building Material.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 21.—The importation of iron, steel and other building materials is being practically killed by the action of the ministry of the interior. Peremptory orders have been sent to the municipalities and provincial councils that all contracts for public works, especially where iron and steel are involved, must be given only to Russian contractors.
