A WAR OVER RATES

This Affects Fraternal Insurance in Iowa State.

OLDER SOCIETIES VS. NEW ONES

National Fraternal Congress Gives Offense—An Appeal to the Legislature.

Special to The Journal. Des Moines, Iowa, Nov. 25.—A war is brewing in this state between the National Fraternal Congress and the Association of Fraternal Beneficial Societies. The differences will come to a head before the legislature this winter. The National Fraternal Congress is seeking to have adopted in this state its table of rates for fraternal beneficiary societies. The Association of Fraternal Beneficial Societies of America is opposed to these rates. The congress is composed of the ordinary beneficiary organizations that feel the need of increasing rates of assessment. In the other organization, are many of the new fraternal beneficiary societies of the west.

The effect of the adoption of the proposed table on the new societies would be to compel them to double their rates approximately. They maintain this is not necessary, inasmuch as they are building up reserve funds and their members will have ample protection. Auditor of State Merriam is favorable to the rates of the National Fraternal congress which have been adopted in several states. Both of the associations are preparing to be represented before the general assembly by strong lobbies. The Brotherhood of American Women, the Knights and Ladies of Security, Charles P. Cross, the M. B. A.'s, and others belong to the Associated Fraternities of America. The opposing organization are the Royal Arcanum, the Macabees, and similar organizations that have been in operation for years. The effect of the adoption of the proposed increased rates, without the endorsement of which it is proposed no beneficiary society can transact business in Iowa, would affect a large constituency and great interest is aroused in the contest.

CATTLE DYING OFF

Sauk Center Stock Attacked by a New and Strange Disease.

Special to The Journal. Sauk Center, Nov. 25.—Farmers are alarmed over a new disease which has developed among cattle in this vicinity and which generally proves fatal. Dr. S. D. Brinclair, veterinary of the state board of health, has just completed an investigation and pronounces the disease to be anthrax, a contagious disease which has as yet been found. A half-dozen of the finest cows on the Alexander Dryden dairy farm have died. The animals, seemingly well at night, are found dead in the morning. Dr. Brinclair says the disease is of so contagious a nature that even pasture lands where a diseased animal has fed is dangerous for other cattle. He advises the burning of dead animals. The disease, or something similar to it, was found in Tennessee in 1898, and no other cases were reported until August, 1900, when it broke out at Newburg, near St. Paul, and then raised in different sections of Minnesota similar cases were reported.

SUNKEN TREASURE

Diver Finds the Wreck of the Steamer Rio de Janeiro.

New York Sun Special Service. San Francisco, Nov. 25.—Expert Diver Sorenson, who has been searching for the wreck of the Pacific Mail steamer Rio de Janeiro since last May, now declares that he has located the sunken treasure ship, which has a cargo valued at over \$500,000, and also Consul General Williams' official papers, which the government is anxious to recover. Sorenson says the wreck lies a half a mile from Port Point, but the currents are so swift about it that he will not be able to make an attempt to raise it until the tide will be favorable. He claims to have found the wreck on Nov. 10, going down with an electric light in his helmet. His scheme is to warp the vessel by cable to a shallower spot and then raise her. Sorenson will get 70 per cent of all recovered.

MISS STODDARD DYING

She Blew Out the Gas in a Red Wing Hotel.

Special to The Journal. Red Wing, Minn., Nov. 25.—Miss Mable Stoddard, 19 years old, of Mazepa, Minn., is dying at Mendel hotel. She was over 100 lbs. when she blew out, but is now only 120 lbs. She was on her way to Minneapolis near which city she was to teach school.

UNWATERING THE OLD GERMANIA.

Special to The Journal. Hurley, Wis., Nov. 25.—The Hayes Mining company has begun pumping water from the old Germania, now Harmsy mine, and expects to operate on a large scale next summer. In a row in a new Finland town west of this place, eight men were badly cut with knives and bayonets with clubs. The doctor and police were called from here. When the morning Chicago & North-Western limited train pulled into this place at its usual hour this morning, it passed a broken switch and the engine was thrown from the track. No serious damage was done.

STATUE FOR WAR EAGLE.

Magee, treasurer of the Floyd Memorial Association, has received a model of the statue that the organization proposes to erect on the War Eagle, the Sioux chiefs, medaled by President Van Buren and known as the "White Man's Friend." The structure is to be of bronze, twelve feet high, and is surmounted by a bust of the Indian.

OLD MINE IS REFOUND

INDIAN DIED WITH HIS SECRET

Silver and Lead in Paying Quantities Found in the Catskill Mountains.

New York, Nov. 25.—After being lost 75 years, the "Ninety Nine" silver mine, once famous through the whole Catskill range, has been found again. At least that is the belief of J. O. Poole, a mining expert, who is said to live in Trenton, N. J. He has discovered a cave in the heart of the Shawangunk mountains, not far from Ellenville, Ulster county, N. Y., which exposes a wide vein of peculiar ore. Numerous assays show heavy vein in silver, lead and other minerals. Poole and the New Jersey men who are backing him are said to have secured mineral rights on more than 5,000 acres and are preparing to start active mining operations. Judge A. T. Clearwater of Kingston said: "A few weeks ago, while tramping through the hills, Poole noticed what seemed to be croppings of silver and copper bearing ore at the base of the Shawangunks. He followed up the lead and made extensive excavations, with the result that he found a cave or opening in the mountain from which he says he has since taken large quantities of almost pure lead ore as well as quartz which bears silver and zinc in large proportions. The mine takes its name from a Wawarsing Indian named Neekyatie, but better known as Ninety-Nine. The Indian lived near Stocking and was accustomed to come among the settlers of the valley with chunks of almost pure lead and silver, which he ex-

ANNOTTING WITH OIL

Ancient Coronation Ceremony Not to Be Omitted.

London, Nov. 25.—Keen interest has been excited by a report for which a ritualistic paper is responsible, that the ceremonies of doing homage and anointing with oil and the celebration of the holy communion will be omitted from the coronation service. It seems improbable, however, that the statement is well founded. The homage is a survival of the old recognition of the sovereign by the people and, although it is no longer necessary to kiss the king's foot, this was done certainly as late as the coronation of Edward VI. The ceremony of anointing dates back to a very remote past. It is pointed out that anointing shall be made on the hands, breast, shoulders and elbows and on the head, last of all; but according to the ancient rite the sovereign was anointed on the head only and the king may on this matter decide to return to the early precedent.
