

# GRIP

## FUNDS FOR PINOS

Majority Report on the Philippine Tariff Bill.

NEEDS FOR REVENUE PRESENTED

Certain and Ample Sources of Cash Necessary for Works of Improvement.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Chairman Payne of the committee on ways and means today presented the majority report on the Philippine tariff bill. It says:

This bill is designed to raise revenue for the government and benefit of the Philippine archipelago. It is intended to restore the status quo which existed prior to the late decision of the supreme court in the diamond rings case. Prior to that decision the government had been collecting duties on goods coming into the United States at the same rates as those provided in our tariff laws for like articles imported from "foreign countries." The court holds that the Philippine archipelago is not a foreign country and therefore the general tariff law does not apply. This bill extends the rate now existing upon imports from foreign countries to articles brought in from the Philippine islands.

The Philippine archipelago the United States Philippine commission prepared a tariff act. Its object has been and is to raise sufficient revenue to support a government in the Philippines to provide ample for education of the people, to open up the highways of commerce both foreign and domestic, and to provide ample police force for the preservation of order. These different forms of tariff in force there have produced a surplus of revenue after paying the expenses of the government. This bill proposes in the first section to make this Philippine tariff a part of the statutes of the United States.

Revenue Ample and Certain. The necessity for the continuance of a revenue which shall both be ample and certain is imperative. If we continue the police and constabulary system which has been inaugurated and which is doing so much to restore the conservative order in the islands, it will call for a large increase in appropriations. We have enrolled 150,000 school children in the public schools. Of this number more than one-half are without any schoolhouse accommodations. It is necessary that we build suitable houses at once. Ten thousand adults were at last accounts enrolled for night schools, and we are told that this number has since increased probably to at least 25,000. These people, anxious to learn our language and to better their mental condition, must be amply provided for. Four thousand teachers have been employed, nearly all of them recently, and their salaries must be paid. This great work of education must not be crippled, even for a short time, for lack of funds.

Our government has gone to work systematically through the commission for the improvement of the harbor at Manila. This contract calls for the expenditure of \$3,000,000 in the near future. Roads are being constructed, and the building of roads in the tropical country is expensive. These are but a few of the many items of expenditure which are imperative. All these expenditures are preparing the way for a reduction of the army and in the end will prove of direct benefit to the taxpayers of the United States.

Tonnage Taxes. The bill also provides for the collection of tonnage taxes on vessels plying between the ports of the United States and the Philippines archipelago. It further provides that "vessels not of the United States may ply between these ports, notwithstanding our coastwise navigation laws, until the 1st day of January, 1905, when it is believed that these islands may safely come under the operation of our present statutes, and vessels only of the United States be employed in our commerce with them."

At present our own people who ship goods to these islands are handicapped by the internal duties imposed here and used in the manufacture of articles sent to the Philippines. The sixth clause of the proposed bill is intended to work slowly in that direction, but the act shall not be converted into the general fund of the United States, but shall be paid in to the treasury of the Philippine islands, to be used and expended for the use and benefit of these islands. The object of the bill is to meet a pressing emergency, practically and efficiently. We present the tariff act in commission as the best that can be devised in the limited time left for us to act.

A SECOND REGIMENT  
Adjutant General Now Pushing Organization in South Dakota.

London, Dec. 13.—Adjutant General Conklin is pushing the work of organization of the Second regiment of the South Dakota guard. It was at first intended to work slowly in that direction, but the supplies have been found to be ample, it is probable that the regiment will be pretty well organized before general to place four companies of the new regiment in the Black Hills section of the state, where, as a battalion, they can keep up an organization of their own, to a large extent independent of the organization east of the river.

Application for companies in the new regiment are already far beyond the places to be filled, and at least half of the towns will be disappointed. The companies of the new regiment already mustered in are A at Britton; B at Clark, and C at Centerville. Other companies will soon be mustered at Plandreau and Canton.
