LANESBORO—Edward Larkin, a resident here since 1832, died suddenly.

RED LAKE FALLS—John Hanson, a young man, accidentally shot and killed himself.

GLENCOE—B. F. Buck, aged 77, who kept a hotel in Minneapolis in 1854, and who came to Glencoe in 1855, is dead.

BENSON—The warehouse of the Crooks and Peterson company was totally destroyed by fire. The loss is \$10,000, fully insured.

HINKLEY—The new telephone company will soon build into this place. Connection will be had with the twin cities and Duluth.

ORTONVILLE—A memorable Christmas transpired at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Joy, the occasion being the golden anniversary of their wedding life.

ST. CLOUD—Thomas Reh, accused of criminal assault, was found not guilty. Albert Reh, a brother, who was implicated in the same affair, was given a new trial.

NEW ULM—Mrs. Theodore Croue was buried yesterday afternoon. She died of heart disease. She left a large estate, which was left to her five children.

WINONA—Leonard K. Eastey, one of the old settlers, died at the hospital. Some time ago he suffered a fracture of his shoulder blade and complications set in, resulting in his death.

GOODHUE—The silver wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Featherstone was observed by many friends. A silver tea set was presented by Rev. G. A. Cahoon on behalf of the company.

MARSHALL—Will Keenan, who was sent to Stillwater about two years ago to serve a term for grand larceny, and who has been out on parole, assaulted his mother and will be returned to the penitentiary.

AKLEY—After several experiments with the clay found in this vicinity, Moore Brothers have decided that it is well adapted to the manufacture of bricks. Machinery has been ordered and the plant is now nearing completion.

STILLWATER—The body of Mrs. James Jackson arrived from Tacoma, Wash., and was laid to rest in Fairview cemetery. The death of Mrs. Julia F. Weir, who had long been ill with cancer, occurred late Saturday night.

HALSTAD—Professor Hayes, of the state experiment farm at St. Anthony Park, has been in Halstad examining soil and gathering specimens of growth from local farms. This is the intention of the state agricultural college to establish an auxiliary experiment farm at Halstad.

OWATONNA—Theodore Thorsen, of Medford, surrendered himself to the sheriff, saying he had shot his father. Thorsen said there was a family quarrel and that his father attempted to strangle him, whereupon he shot in self-defense. The ball entered the older Thorsen's shoulder.

COUNCIL BLUFFS—In the district court, the attorney for James Doyle filed a motion for judgment in the suit of Doyle against James F. Burns for \$48,748 in addition to the \$48,922 allowed by the jury in its verdict.

OTTUMWA—The remains of Miss Jeannette Phillips, daughter of the democratic candidate for governor, have arrived from Los Angeles, where she died on an operating table. Her death revealed a secret marriage, to which she confessed before she died.

CHIPPEWA FALLS—Mrs. Frank Grimmer was held up and robbed of \$3 and two gold rings.

STURGEON RAY—The 2-year-old child of Herman Wray died this morning from the effects of scalding.

ANTIGO—Sheldon Shaufelt, an early settler and prosperous lumberman, living in Norway, dropped dead.

POUND—The sawmill of Isaac Rund was totally destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$30,000, with no insurance.

NEKOOSA—Guy Gorstein, 18 years old, son of James Gorstein, accidentally shot himself while rabbit hunting. It is thought he cannot live.

OSHKOSH—The fifth annual exhibition of the Wisconsin State Poultry association will be held in this city next week. It will last five days and will open Jan. 27.

NEW RICHMOND—William Gunderson has been bound over on a charge of holding up and robbing John Lind of a sum of money on the streets of New Richmond.

PRAIRIE DU CHIEN—George Priest, brakeman on the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern, fell from the top of a car at Vinon, Iowa, and had both legs cut off.

ASHLAND—An Indian on the Bad River reservation assaulted Deputy Sheriff Stryer of Odanah. The Indian has been arrested. The officer
