TO WELCOME NEW YEAR THEY TOOK PIES

Small Boy Cave Dwellers Suspected of Petty Thefts.

THEY RETREAT IS DESTROYED Banditti in Knickerbockers Are Homeless, but Are in Luck

"Cave in the woods, Fremont and Twenty-seventh avenue N. Kill it."

Thus read a note on a "kick sheet" of the desk of Fred Coffin, captain of the mounted squad of police, at headquarters last morning when the first battalion of the cavalry retired to the city hall at 12:30 to-day.

Two mounted patrolmen to the case, and they were ordered to the suburban district on a destructive errand. Arriving at the address given, they proceeded, with a conspicuous absence of economy, to destroy the snug little retreat in the ground that had been built with a great deal of labor and ingenuity by a dozen youngsters of North Town.

In this subterranean refuge its builders had first found a happy life untroubled by anxious parents and far from the dismal confines of the school rooms. Since along in the summer their secret was well kept, but it has crept out, and with the exception of many other facts in connection with their home in the woods have been brought to light and not all of them revert to the credit of the lads.

During the past few months frequent reports have been made to the police of raids upon pantries and store houses in residences in the district. Families have believed that the robberies were committed by hungry tramps, but all kinds of goods disappeared from merchants' delivery wagons on their rounds in the vicinity, and, as winter became more severe, large holes were made in wood piles. Youngsters in that part of town were suspected, and interested parents watched their boys, whose frequent absences from home made them suspicious, and the cave was discovered.

This little habitation was dug out of the earth in the summer, and was covered with a thick layer of brush, over which was placed a thatch of brush, hay and other material that would keep out the cold and wet. A small stove was covered with a "den" and a large pile of wood was accumulated for the winter days. The lads who were in the secret often stayed away from home for days at a time, and yet they never more severe, and large holes were made in wood piles. Youngsters in that part of town were suspected, and interested parents watched their boys, whose frequent absences from home made them suspicious, and the cave was discovered.

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ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE

THE TRANSFER & STORAGE COMPANY. We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Minnesota, do hereby certify that we are the promoters of the same.

ARTICLE II. The name of this corporation shall be "THE TRANSFER & STORAGE COMPANY."

ARTICLE III. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the first (1st) day of January, A. D. 1902, and it shall continue thirty years.

ARTICLE IV. The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), which shall be divided into one hundred shares of one hundred dollars each.

ARTICLE V. No indebtedness or liability shall be incurred for this corporation by any officer or stockholder, without the authority of the board of directors, and the unsecured indebtedness of the corporation shall at no time exceed twenty thousand dollars.

ARTICLE VI. The persons forming this company for incorporation shall be the first (1st) day of January, A. D. 1902, and it shall continue thirty years.

ARTICLE VII. The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a board of directors composed of seven persons who shall be chosen by the stockholders.

ARTICLE VIII. The shares of stock of this corporation may be issued in whole or in part before the meeting of the board of directors, provided, however, that the issue of either preferred or common stock, respectively, shall not exceed one-half of the total authorized capital stock of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX. The regular dividends on the stock of this corporation shall be payable quarterly at the rate of six per cent per annum, and the dividend for each quarter of the calendar year shall be payable on the tenth day of the month following that in which it expires, namely, on the tenth days of January, April, July and October.

ARTICLE X. The holders of preferred stock shall be entitled to draw dividends thereon, out of any surplus or profits which may be available for the payment of dividends, or out of any amount of such surplus or profits which shall be declared a dividend thereon at such lower rate as may be determined by the board of directors.

ARTICLE XI. The holders of common stock shall be entitled to draw dividends thereon, out of any surplus or profits which may be available for the payment of dividends, or out of any amount of such surplus or profits which shall be declared a dividend thereon at such lower rate as may be determined by the board of directors.

ARTICLE XII. The board of directors may declare a special dividend on the common stock to be payable at such time and in such manner as they may deem advisable.

ARTICLE XIII. To ensure the more certain and regular payment of dividends on the preferred stock of this company, there shall be set aside a special fund or account to be known as the "Dividend Fund," and the amount of the surplus or profits of the corporation shall be reduced by the amount of the dividend on the preferred stock, and the amount of the dividend on the common stock shall be paid out of the amount of the surplus or profits of the corporation remaining after the payment of the dividend on the preferred stock.
