**In Labor's Field**  
**TICKET FOR LABOR**  
Minneapolis Unions Urged to Bring Out Municipal Candidates.  
**ANSONIA HAS A LABOR REGIME**  
The Mayor is a Unionist and Will Appoint None but Union Men.  
Inspired by the success of union labor tickets in several of the cities of the country, organized labor leaders in Minneapolis are agitating the matter of putting in the field an organized labor city ticket this fall. Ansonia, Conn., elected a member of organized labor mayor, and he is pledged to appoint none but members in good standing with organized labor to positions under him. It is proposed there to have an example of a city officered throughout by real working men. The new mayor has announced his intention to pursue this program clear through his term. With the above as its text, The Union,

the organ of organized labor in Minneapolis, declares this week that it is time Minneapolis labor took the same course. It insists that there is plenty of material in the ranks of organized labor here to fill every office in the gift of the people, and says that the result would be a clean and efficient administration of city affairs. A ticket made up of the ablest representatives of labor and standing on a platform of "municipal ownership of public utilities" would be a sure winner, the Union says.  
It suggests M. E. Neary, John W. Hays, Louis Hansen, John O'Donnell and George W. Moray as men competent to head the ticket.  
**SOCIAL GLASS WORKERS**  
They Will Give a Series of Open Meetings.  
The glass workers will give a series of open meetings this winter, the first of which will be held on the evening of Jan. 17. It is proposed to provide entertainment, including music and speeches, at each of these meetings. Among the entertainers at the first meeting will be Alvin Carr and the Pittsburg Plate Glass company quartet, with John O'Donnell, Louis Hansen and E. E. Stevens as speakers.

**A Garment Workers' Revival.**  
The Garment Workers' union has started a campaign for a revival of interest in the organization, and a material increase in membership. The new scale will be enforced in the shops that are under the control of the union, and it is expected that it will be introduced into other shops very soon.  
**Firemen's New Officers.**  
The following officers will serve the stationary firemen for the next term: President, Michael McCune; vice president, Robert Howard; secretary and treasurer, James Hulbert; financial secretary, W. Wynman; sergeant-at-arms, S. Shepard; delegates to Trades and Labor Council, M. McCune, W. Wynman, M. Kiere.  
**The Trades and Labor Year.**  
There were fifty-six unions affiliated with the Trades and Labor Council at the close of the year, with nine in arrears and eight suspended. The council will push aggressively this winter the organization of unions in fields never before occupied.

**FOR DISTRESSED POLICEMEN**  
Proceeds of a Souvenir Will Be Used for Relief.  
P. L. Talbot, compiler and publisher of the souvenir of the Minneapolis police department, has turned over to Superintendent of Police Fred W. Ames a check for \$1,175, the proceeds from the book. All of this was made from advertising matter, the policemen not being asked to contribute. Each officer has been given three of the souvenirs free of cost. The \$1,175 will be placed in an emergency fund, for the use of needy officers. It has been deposited, credited to the Minneapolis police department, and will be available for any deserving policeman, and will not be effected by any changes that may occur in the personnel of the department. Mr. Talbot will leave this evening for St. Louis, where he will get out a souvenir of the police department of that city. This book will be completed in time for distribution before the Louisiana purchase exposition.
