RISE OF GOVERNOR SHAW

IN STATE AND NATION

Hard Campaigning for Honest Money Made His Reputation—His First Nomination at Cedar Rapids.

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Jan. 6.—The rise of Leslie M. Shaw into political prominence is due largely, almost solely, to the fact that he had the power to think and the courage to say what he thought. He was the first public speaker in Iowa, perhaps in the west, to take an advanced position in favor of the gold standard. As far back as 1876, when the silver issue first forged to the front in Iowa, he made speeches in favor of a single gold standard. He had studied the money question since he graduated at Cornell college, Mount Vernon, in 1874, both orally and in a practical way as a banker and a lawyer at Denison. His speeches in 1876 were as advanced for the single standard as those he delivered during the campaign of 1900.

COUNTY BOARD TROUBLE

RICHLAND HAS THE REAL THING

Held-Over Members Restrained by Judge Lauder From Making Appointments.

Special to The Journal. Wahpeton, N. D., Jan. 6.—The probability is that Richland county will have no county commissioners for some time, and that the county will be developed, the situation arising out of a restraining order made by Judge Lauder to prevent the appointment of two new commissioners. The case arose out of a law passed last year to remedy defects. A law of 1885 provided that Richland and Sargent counties, with two others, which now are a part of South Dakota, should have their terms of office for their county commissioners, extending for two years, with all other parts of the territory. The law of 1885 provided that the terms for these officers should be four years, and that the commissioners whose terms expired in 1901 should be succeeded by appointees of a board to meet at the call of the county auditor and to consist of the remaining members of the commissioners' board, the county auditor and the county judge.

NEW HEAD OF N. DAKOTA CHURCH

The service was well attended, and the bishop's address was highly praised.

APPROVED BY GOPPERS

Report on the National Civic Federation Conference.

New York, Jan. 6.—The report of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who attended the national meeting of the National Civic Federation, was read at a meeting of the central executive union here held here. Mr. Gompers stated that the movement would establish right relations between capital and labor and prevent or reduce the number of strikes. Several socialist members of the union made an attack on the National Civic Federation. The socialists wanted a resolution passed denouncing the federation and its members. It was decided to leave the matter to a referendum vote of the different affiliated unions.

SOCIALISM ANALYZED

Archbishop Corrigan Finds Flaws in the System.

New York, Jan. 6.—Archbishop Corrigan has just preached a sermon on socialism at St. Patrick's cathedral, which has attracted general attention. He said the theories of the socialists would be found faulty in actual practice. He pointed out the flaws in the socialist system, particularly its failure to recognize the value of individual initiative and the importance of property rights. He argued that socialism would lead to a loss of freedom and a decline in the standard of living.

It is, however, disappointing to see that we are excelled in Australia, and so, too, it is to find confirmation of the rather disquieting fact that Canada has difficulty in attracting settlers and that her territories remain empty in spite of her improved means of colonization and the offers made to colonists.'
