BRUNK'S SECOND GAS WELL

Stronger Flow Than the First Which Has Now Ptered Out.

Special to The Journal. Fergus Falls, Minn., Jan. 15.—Another gas well has been sunk on the Brunk farm in the town of Pelican. In the first run the gas was found at a depth of about 100 feet. The drill struck stones and met with other misfortunes, but when it was finally put into working order, it passed through the sandy strata in which the gas was found at a distance of about 200 feet, and as the pipe went deeper, the flow of gas was shut off. Meantime operations were begun on another well on the same farm, some 110 feet from the first one. The drill in this well reached the 100-foot level to-day, and again tapped the gas vein, the flow being stronger than that of the first well.

S. D. LAND SPECULATION

Center About to Shift From Southern to Northern Sections.

WRECKED A BUILDING

Safe Blowers at Wentworth, S. D., Get Away.

Madison, S. D., Jan. 15.—An attempted burglary of the A. J. Harrington bank at Wentworth, yesterday, resulted in the blowing off of the outer door of the safe and wrecking the building. The explosion alarmed the neighborhood and the robbers fled in haste, but were prepared to escape, having previously stolen C. W. Alverson's team and buggy. They were tracked into the country to a place south of Orange, in Brown county, and there the trail was lost.

PASSENGER CAR QUARANTINED

Five Persons, Three of One Family, Are Shut Up.

Houghton, Mich., Jan. 15.—On a siding at Keweenaw Bay, a Mineral Range passenger car is quarantined with five inmates—husband, wife and child, and two men. The child was found to be ill with scarlet fever, the coach was locked, detached from the train, and placed on a sidetrack, and none of the occupants will be permitted to leave until the little one is convalescent.

Voters Will Choose Site.

Hokah, Minn., Jan. 15.—The county commissioners have decided to submit the question of a site for the proposed new county courthouse to a vote of the people at the coming annual spring election. Four propositions will be submitted. For the present location, one mile from Hokah; one mile from Houghton; one mile from Caladoun. The outcome is uncertain, but a change will probably be made, although the county would save by building on the present site.
