CATHOLIC COLORADO "ANTI" Rev. Thomas Malone Denounces the Woman Suffrage There. Denver, Col., Jan. 20.—Rev. Thomas H. Malone, who is identified with the papal diplomatic service, spoke yesterday in denunciation of woman suffrage. He said: "In this state there is an institution known as woman suffrage. That Catholic women will from time to time, as circumstances arise, utilize the privilege which has been given them is, perhaps, true. "But we know those of us who are imbued with the spirit of Catholicism, that this institution will never appeal to the Catholic wife or mother, because she is concerned that her greatest sphere is the home, surrounded by her husband and children and receiving the homage and adoration of them. "Politicians of both parties are privately opposed to suffrage, and it is to be deplored that they are afraid to publicly express their private convictions."

AN EXCITING SOCIETY A Church Hugging Schedule Scandalized the Elders. Toledo, Ohio, Jan. 20.—The church hugging society, organized last week at Belle Center, Ohio, is raising no end of disturbance there and at other points in the state. It was at first proposed rather as a joke by some fun-loving girls connected with the little village church, but created so much excitement that the society was formally organized with B. C. Bates as president and M. J. Denison as acting secretary. The schedule approved is as follows: "Girls under 15 years of age, 15 cents for a hug of two minutes, or 10 cents for a short squeeze; under 20 years, 50 cents; from 20 to 25, 75 cents; schoolmarms, 40 cents; other men's wives, \$1; old maids, 3 cents each and no time limit." The society has forty-three members, and on Thursday evening an up-to-date performance was given along the schedule lines. Another set for Feb. 7. The older people of the church are up in arms.

LARGEST ON THE ROAD Company Playing "The Chaperons" to Be Here Next Week.

There is no business so fraught with uncertainties as the management of a big theatrical attraction, and the fact has seldom been better illustrated than by the booking of Frank L. Perley's new musical comedy, "The Chaperons," for an engagement of one week at the Metropolitan theater, beginning next Monday night. Arrangements for this engagement were not perfected until late Saturday afternoon, and in order to get here by Monday the company will have to make a run of considerable length over a thousand miles in a special train. As the organization is one of the largest on tour the trip alone will cost Mr. Perley \$4,000 outright. The Minneapolis date will be the first filled by "The Chaperons" in the west.

"The Chaperons" is the largest musical organization on the road. It has been given a lavish production, a production in keeping with the reputation of Mr. Perley, whose liberality in that direction will be pleasantly remembered by theater goers who recall the many engagements of Alice Nielsen in this city and the presentation of "Princess Chloé" given here last season. In the company are Harry Connor, Walter Jones, Joseph C. Milton, Ed. Redway, George K. Henry, Marie Callahan, Eva Tansie, Nellie Polle and several others, all of whom have been associated with big New York successes. Curiously enough Harry Connor was written for by the late Ed. Redway, who was killed in a fall, and he could not be secured for the opening, as he was in London at the time with "The Comedy of the Three Acts, the scene of the first being in the Latin Quarter, Paris, and of the second in Alexandria, Egypt. The book is by Frederic Ranken and the music by Isadore Witmark.

HOEVEL CONCERT The Second of the Series to-morrow Night.

To-morrow night will be given the second of the Hoevel quartet chamber concert at the Unitarian church. It is looked forward to as one of the best treats of the season. SEEK TO RECOVER FEET Friends of T. S. Martin Would Bury Them With His Body.

The fellow workmen of T. S. Martin, the Northern Pacific brakeman who was killed in the yards near St. Anthony Park Saturday morning, have asked that the feet which were amputated at the hospital be returned over to the undertaker for interment with the remains. Inquiry at the city hospital, however, brought the reply that the feet had been placed in the hospital in accordance with the usual custom. Nelson, the city physician, denied that there is any intention to retain the amputated members for experimental purposes and it is not agreed by the attendance at the hospital. The remains of Martin will be taken to his old home at Jonesboro, Tenn., to-night.

PARENTS OBJECT Don't Like Transfer of Greeley School Pupils to Adams.

Parents and taxpayers to the number of 533 signed a petition which was handed to Superintendent Jordan Friday night by the Rev. G. A. Cleveland of the Immanuel Baptist church. The petition complains of the transfer of the eighth grade pupils of the Greeley school, Twenty-sixth street and Twelfth avenue S., to the Adams school at Franklin and Sixthteenth avenue S. The parents object that the new accommodations are inferior, that many of the students will have to walk long distances, that the children will be greatly hampered by their new surroundings and that the change is entirely unnecessary. Dr. Jordan has not said definitely what his action in the matter will be.

DISMISSED BY THE COURT Judge Dickinson Doesn't Give Prisoner a Chance to Enter Plea. A rebuke to the police department for its methods was given in the municipal court this morning when Judge Dickinson dismissed the case of Leon Haycock, 18 years old. The order was announced before the boy, who was charged with disorderly conduct, had a chance to enter a plea. Young Haycock was arrested yesterday by Patrolmen Foster and Burke, it being alleged that he had created a disturbance in a poolroom in North Minneapolis. It appears that the officers arrested the boy upon the complaint of others. They had evidently forgotten that it is necessary to have a warrant for arrests except where the crime is witnessed by the officers. The judge, taking cognizance of this fact and also of the fact that the arrest was an admission on the part of the police of their having permitted the violation of the Sunday closing law, dismissed the case after the complaint had been read and before the accused had had an opportunity to answer the charge.
