Lecturer Emphasizes Old Saying as to an Ounce of Prevention.

Jacob A. Riis, the famous newspaper reporter of the New York Sun, lectured on "The Slums" before a large audience in the auditorium of the Chicago Y. M. C. A. last evening. The address, which was illustrated by stereopticon views, dealt with past and present conditions in New York's tenements, and the renovation of the slums in the past twenty years. The lecture was absorbingly interesting. There was much that was pathos, in fact, almost heart-rending, in the marvelous work of improvement leagues and reform police commissions, in which work Mr. Riis himself is one of the most aggressive and successful leaders. He has done much to change the conditions.

Mr. Riis was introduced by J. S. McLean, who spoke briefly of the great influence of the newspaper reporter in general, and of the wonderfully successful efforts of Mr. Riis in particular. Mr. Riis' search for news in the slums, and his appreciation of the awful condition of the poor, and the urgent need for improvement in their daily life and environment.

BISHOP MANN'S RING

Beautiful Gift of His Friends in Kansas City.

Bishop Cameron Mann of North Dakota, who is in the city to attend the Epiphany meeting of the church club, took up the duties of his episcopal office Jan. 1. On New Year's day, before his departure from Kansas City, he was the recipient of a most beautiful Episcopal ring, the gift of friends. The ring is of massive gold, set with an amethyst of fine purple. The heavy setting is chased in oak leaves, the badge of the Scottish clan of Macdonald, from which Bishop Mann's father was descended. One side of the setting bears a wheat sheaf, with the cross emerging, which is the seal of the cathedral of North Dakota. The reverse side has a plain Latin cross. Around the setting are chased three gold cords, emblematic of the three-fold cord of faith, hope and charity. The amethyst bears the usual crest of the bishop's mitre. The coat of arms on the shield below is quartered by a St. Andrew's cross, the Scottish emblem. In the quarters are the oak leaf of the Macdonald clan, the falcon of the house of Schuyler, Bishop Mann's mother's family, and the wheat sheaf of the cathedral of North Dakota. The shield also bears a canton with the bishop's crozier. The ring was designed by R. H. Cram of Boston, an architect of fame, the leading American expert in heraldry. Inside the ring is engraved with the inscription: "Cameron Mann, December 4, 1901. From Friends."
